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This study describes investigations made in an effort to solve a long-standing mystery concerning the origins of Thomas Fisher, who married Elizabeth Huntley in Chester County, Pennsylvania in 1713. A new solution is proposed, and all the families which were studied are discussed. The notes collected during the study are included for reference and further study.

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Preface

This book is for all the descendants and possible relatives of the immigrant Thomas Fisher, who obtained land jointly with Thomas Robinson in Chester County, Pennsylvania in early 1701 and who married Elizabeth Huntley there in 1713. It should also be useful in tracing other Fishers of colonial Pennsylvania to their old-world beginnings. The findings from many years of research are collected here for study.

There are not enough surviving records to support a guaranteed pedigree for Thomas Fisher of Chester County, but there are numerous records which support a possible explanation of his family history. I have described the records I found, and have commented upon what I believe they imply. Readers should make their own judgements. This is what I have concluded:

I think Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania may have been one of the English/Irish Fishers of Dublin County, Ireland, with roots along the Mersey River in England and places to the north of there. The Mersey bounded old Lancashire on its north bank and Cheshire on the south bank. The Fishers were in the Mersey valley as early as the late 1500s. The population centers of influence were Liverpool and Manchester on the Lancashire side, and Chester on the Cheshire side.

As early as 1598, a William Fisher lived at Elton in Thornton-Le-Moors Parish on the Cheshire side of the Mersey, a little upstream from Liverpool and not far from Chester. The Fishers in the area were good Church of England members, and one of them was churchwarden at Stoak beginning in 1642. There were early Fishers in the fishing villages of Ince, Sutton and Frodsham, all near Elton. William Fisher of Elton married a wife Margaret who was the mother of Joseph Fisher, born in 1635, a known immigrant to Ireland and Pennsylvania, and a number of other children. A Robinson family were neighbors of the Fishers at Elton, and other Robinsons lived in the adjoining parishes. This may be relevant to later events which are explored in this book.

By 1659, some of the Mersey River Fishers had moved into Ireland. Joseph, Martha and Mary Fisher, and possibly other children of William and Margaret Fisher, cast their lot with the new Quaker movement begun by George Fox, thereby becoming illegal dissenters from the lawful Church of England. It is not clear whether the parents also left Elton. Margaret Fisher who died in Dublin in 1669 may have been the mother from Elton. Some of the Robinsons and other Fisher relatives may have gone to Ireland, but some of them apparently wavered between membership in the established church and the Quakers in Ireland, making the records more obscure. Among the Quakers, Mary married in County Louth, Martha married in Rosenallis, County Queens, and Joseph married in Dublin County. In Dublin County, only the family of Joseph Fisher, born in Elton, Cheshire, appears in the Quaker records. Although the other Dublin County Fishers appear only in the Church of Ireland (Anglican) records, some delayed baptisms in the Robert Fisher family and marriages one day apart of Thomas and Robert all appear to be legalization of previous Quaker marriages.

The Elton Fishers went from County Louth to Rosenallis in County Queens, then settled in southeast Dublin County and became part of the merchant class of Dublin. Joseph, son of William, married at Rathfarnum in 1671 and lived soon after in Stillorgan Parish, probably a tenant on the Stillorgan estate (site of the Stillorgan Castle ruins.) His business partner in Dublin County was the Quaker Robert Turner, a "traveling clothier" from the Yorkshire linen industry who became a wealthy draper and married Martha Fisher (sister of Joseph).

In the 1670's Thomas Robinson, Thomas Fisher, and Elizabeth Fisher all lived in the village of Carrickmaine, two miles from Joseph Fisher in Dublin County. Thomas Robinson and Elizabeth Fisher married in 1672, and she died in childbirth in 1679. Living nearby were several Fisher families at Dun Leary (Laoghaire), Leopardstown, Glanagary and Killiney, who appear to have been connected.

By 1682 Joseph Fisher of Stillorgan and his brother-in-law Robert Turner had decided to immigrate together to America. They recruited 28 indentured servants at the Port of Dublin and may have had to go to

Liverpool for departure. In England, they negotiated a joint purchase of 10,000 acres in Pennsylvania from William Penn. Francis Standfield of Cheshire also bought land from Penn, in 1681, and took his family to the village of Gorton, Garston or Garton near Liverpool or Manchester. (I think the record is in error which says "Garton in Cheshire," which has never existed, but it may have been Gorton at the edge of Manchester, almost but not quite in a tip of Cheshire, or Garston near Liverpool, across the Mersey river from north Cheshire.) The Fishers and Standfields could have been in brief attendance together at the Quaker meeting at Hardshaw near Liverpool, but no record was found. The Fisher and Standfield families were linked in 1713 when Thomas Fisher of Chester County married Elizabeth Huntley, granddaughter of Francis Standfield.

In the summer of 1683, two ships from Liverpool departed with the Fishers and Standfields among the passengers. The Standfields embarked on the "Endeavor" and arrived in Philadelphia at the end of August; the Joseph Fisher family took the "Lion" and arrived two weeks later. In 1685 George Fisher (almost certainly a relative of Joseph Fisher) and some of the Irish Robinsons bound themselves to Jaspar Farmer of Cork, a former army major who served with Oliver Cromwell in his suppression of the Irish rebellion. They boarded the "Bristol Comfort" and arrived in Philadelphia in November of 1685.

We may never know with certainty which of several Thomas Fishers of southeast Dublin County may have come to Pennsylvania. We do know that Elizabeth Fisher married Thomas Robinson in 1672 and lived near Joseph Fisher, who immigrated in 1683 to Philadelphia. I think there is an excellent chance that Thomas, Joseph, Elizabeth, John, and Robert Fisher, young adults who lived near Monkstown in the 1670's, were of our ancestral family. They may have been siblings.

Thomas Robinson may have emigrated aboard the "Tryall," a brigantine with which he had some association. Thomas Robinson and a George Fisher appear in the records of Chester County, Pennsylvania in 1688, and a John Fisher was there before 1700. A Thomas Fisher was in Carrickmaine at least until 1681, when a son Robert was born. After that, he left Carrickmaine. He or one of the other Thomas Fishers of the area could have emigrated with Thomas Robinson or at a later time. The immigrant Thomas Fisher was probably the one who obtained land in Chester County in early 1701, and Thomas who lived on the land by 1713/14 was probably his son. They could have been Thomas Sr. & Jr. of Dun Leary, who appear in the Monkstown church records.

Upon arrival in Pennsylvania, the Robinsons and Fishers may have attended the Immanuel Anglican Church in Newcastle County (now part of Delaware). James Robinson, possible relative of Thomas Robinson, was a churchwarden there in 1710. Thomas Robinson apparently never became a Quaker, but Thomas Fisher of Chester County was a Quaker by 1713. Thomas Fisher and Elizabeth Huntley, both members of Concord Monthly Meeting, married in May of 1713. The Fishers took up residence on the Robinson/Fisher tract in Kennett Township in 1714. Thomas Robinson shared the tax assessment of 1715 with Thomas Fisher, then probably died soon after. By 1739, the entire farm was in possession of Thomas and Elizabeth Fisher. My family are among their many known descendants.

The Robinson/Fisher land in Pennsylvania was first surveyed by an Irish surveyor. Two of Thomas Fisher's children in Pennsylvania married Irish immigrants, and some of his closest neighbors were from Ireland. When he died in Chester County in 1747, both witnesses to his will were Irish. One was William Pim, whose forebears were among the original founders of Quakerism in Ireland.

All this seems to support my own grandfather's statement to me that his Fisher ancestors came from a place in Ireland that had a castle. Monkstown Castle can still be visited, and there were once small castle ruins at Stillorgan and Carrickmaine.

I. Introduction

In 1995 I completed an initial study of my Fisher ancestral line which extends back to Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania, who married Elizabeth Huntley in 1713. The 1995 findings can be found in the set of books listed in the frontispiece of this volume. The story of Thomas Fisher and Elizabeth Huntley as I then understood it is included in those references.

Large numbers of Fishers can trace their descent from Thomas and Elizabeth Fisher, and several claims and surmises have been made by various researchers as to the origin of Thomas. None have been proven correct, and some can now be ruled out.* I have searched extensively since 1995 in an effort to discover more about Thomas Fisher, and have found additional information (with the invaluable help of some other researchers).

A study was made of all the known Fishers of the early settlements around the Delaware and Chesapeake bays, and many Fishers of Ireland, England and other places. Neighbors, relatives and associates of the Chester County Fishers were studied for clues regarding Thomas Fisher's life. I have included the results of all the studies in this book, as an aid to others doing Fisher research.

The search for Thomas Fisher's origins finally led to the Union of Monkstown, Dublin County in Ireland, and to places in England before that. I am now reasonably certain that Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania came from the Fishers of Cheshire and Dublin County.

*My own guess, in "Ancestors & Descendants of Cephas Fisher Jr.," 1995, that Thomas Fisher was from the family of Denis & Susannah Fisher of Hampshire and Salem, West Jersey, was not supported by further research.

For those who think Thomas Fisher of Chester County (who married Elizabeth Huntley in 1713 at Concord Monthly Meeting) was the same as Thomas, son of John and Margaret Fisher of Lewes in Sussex County, Delaware (originally part of Pennsylvania): This notion is easily disproved, but unfortunately it is one which is widely believed and is being compounded by researchers who have not checked the source records. The records are quite clear: Thomas Fisher of Sussex County left a detailed will dated 17 November 1713, which is reproduced in Anna Wharton Smith's book, "Genealogy of the Fisher Family," 1896. His last act as registrar of lands in Sussex County was in November of 1713, after which a replacement was named (Land Records of Sussex County). Any doubt that he died soon after is dispelled by the fact that his widow, Margery (Maud) Fisher, had remarried by February of 1718, to Nicholas Green of Sussex County. A Sussex County land record in that month named Margery Green, wife of Nicholas, and Jabez Maud Fisher, son of Margery Green. The record can be found on LDS Film 0006626, land records of Sussex County. Thomas Fisher of Chester County had a long and well-documented life, and died in 1747 in East Caln, Chester County. His will is number 1051, Chester County Wills.

^{*}Another well-known theory, put forth by Benjamin Cummings in "A Fisher Family of Chester County, Pa.", 1898, LDS Film 1033648, is that Thomas Fisher was Thomas, son of the Quakers John Fisher and Sarah (Hutchins) Fisher of Barmstone on the eastern shore of Yorkshire. Cummings questioned the accuracy of an earlier work by Thomas Potts, "Our Family Ancestors," 1895, LDS Film 962253. But the Quaker records of Hull in Yorkshire (LDS Film 588433) agree with Potts, showing clearly that Thomas, son of John and Sarah Fisher of Barmstone died there in 1735.

3. Irish Points of Immigration to Pennsylvania (Map)

Ballynachree, Ballymoney, Antrim – Joseph Wilkinson, Quaker son-in-law of Thomas Fisher of Chester County Pa. came from here, 1730. Lurgan – Alice Stanfield, Quaker daughter-in-law of Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pa. came from here, 1728.

Belleniskcrannell, Parish of Segoe, County Armagh -- Henry Hollingsworth was born here, 1658. He immigrated to Pennsylvania in 1683 with Joseph Fisher and Robert Turner. He surveyed the tract of Thomas Fisher and Thomas Robinson in Chester County, Pennsylvania in 1701.

Donnahlong, County Down – George Harlan, Quaker, formerly of Monkwearmouth in Durham County in England, lived here before immigrating to Pennsylvania in 1682. His sons became close neighbors of Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania.

County Louth – Mary Fisher, Quaker, sister of Joseph Fisher of Stillorgan in Dublin County, married here in 1659, to William Archer. Stillorgan Parish, Dublin County – Joseph Fisher, Quaker, son of William and Margaret Fisher of Elton, Thornton le Moors Parish, Cheshire, married (1) Isobel Newmarch, & (2) Elizabeth --, lived here before immigrating to Philadelphia in 1683.

County Queens, Rosenallis -- Martha Fisher, Quaker, sister of Joseph Fisher of Stillorgan in Dublin County, married here in 1665, to Robert Turner.

Durrow, County Kilkenny -- Thomas Paine, who witnessed the will of Thomas Fisher of Chester County in 1747, immigrated from here.

County Queens (Leix) - William Pim, who witnessed the will of Thomas Fisher of Chester County in 1747, immigrated from here.

Garankeanesfeake, Cork Bay - George Fisher immigrated to Pennsylvania in 1685 with the Jaspar Farmer Family from here.

4. Early Fisher Immigrants to Pennsylvania and Nearby Regions (Map)

Cumberland, Pardshaw - John Fisher, Quaker, emigrated from here to Bucks County, Pennsylvania, in 1700.

Cumberland, Kentmere – John Fisher, Quaker immigrant to Pennsylvania from Marsden and Clitheroe, may have been born here, the son of Nicholas Fisher.

Westmoreland – John Fisher, Quaker immigrant to Pennsylvania from Marsden and Clitheroe, may have been related to the Westmoreland Fishers.

Lancashire, Clitheroe – John and Margaret Fisher, Quakers, emigrated from near here in 1682/3 to Philadelphia, then settled in Sussex County, Delaware.

Lancashire, Marsden -- John and Margaret Fisher, Quakers, were members of Marsden Monthly Meeting when they emigrated from near here in 1682/3 to Philadelphia.

Lancashire, Hundred of West Derby near Liverpool – Thomas Fisher emigrated from here in 1684 with the Quaker family of Henry Baker. The Bakers settled in Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

Cheshire, Elton, Thornton le Moors Parish – Joseph Fisher, Quaker, was born here in 1635, son of William and Margaret Fisher. Went to Ireland by 1659 and emigrated from there to Philadelphia in 1683.

Herefordshire, Ross-on-Wye – William Fisher, Quaker, emigrated from here in 1684, to Philadelphia.

Somersetshire, Horsington Parish - John Fisher from here was indentured in Bristol in 1684 for passage to Pennsylvania.

Hampshire, Portsmouth and Sussex, Chichester – Dennis and Susannah Fisher emigrated from here by 1683 to Salem County, West New Jersey. East Yorkshire, Barmstone – John Fisher from here has been associated with John Fisher of Bucks County, Pennsylvania who immigrated in 1700. Evidence shows that this may not be right.

Buckingham Township – John Fisher from Cumberland, 1700; died here in 1765.

Falls Township – John Fisher arrived from Pardshaw, Cumberland, 1700.

Philadelphia - William Fisher from Ross in Herefordshire, 1684.

Kingsessing, Mouth of Schulkill River - John & Sarah Fisher, by 1684.

II. Thomas Fisher's Origins in England and Ireland

Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania is first mentioned in a land warrant dated March 6, 1701, signed by William Penn, granting a survey of 300 acres to Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher "near the Brandywine." Subsequent records show that the tract was surveyed at 200 acres, lying in the eastern part of Kennett Township in Chester County which is now Pennsbury Township. The earliest tax record available shows that both Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher were landowners there in 1715. Thomas Robinson does not appear in the Kennett records thereafter, and his fate is unknown.

In May of 1713, Thomas Fisher married Elizabeth Huntley, daughter of William Huntley, at the Concord Monthly Meeting of the Quakers in Chester County, Pennsylvania. They settled on the Kennett land grant of 1701, and moved their Quaker membership to Kennett (Newark Monthly Meeting) in the spring of 1714. Thomas was the earliest proven ancestor of my own Fisher family.

To trace Thomas Fisher to his origins, I began a search for a locality with a Thomas Robinson and a Thomas Fisher, together at the right time, with some kind of family connection between the Robinsons and Fishers. I found one such place, which I think establishes an English/Irish ancestry for Thomas Fisher of Chester County.

The Fishers of Ireland

The Celtic Gaels brought their culture and language from Europe to Ireland prior to the Christian era, and became the "old Irish" people who were converted by Catholic missionaries in the fifth century. The Fisher surname did not exist in Ireland until English influence developed from the twelfth through sixteenth centuries. James I granted large plantations to the landed gentry of England and Scotland, who displaced many Irish landowners from their lands along the east coast and established an ever-growing "pale" of English control. Arrivals in Dublin by 1600 included Sir Edward Fisher and his brother Richard, and Vincent Fisher, a vintner. They were perhaps the first Fishers in Ireland. In 1611 Sir Edward, an English adventurer, received from the crown a large tract in west Dublin upon which he built a manor house called Phoenix Park. The park is still to be found by that name. He also received large tracts in Wexford and other places. In the cess of 1621, he lived on Fishmonger Street in St. Johns Parish in Dublin, and died there in 1630. By 1634, the records mention William Fisher and his son Thomas, and Hugh Fisher, vicar of St. John's. St. John's is on the south side of the River Liffey, near the site of the original Viking settlement of Dubh Lin, or "black pool." The City of Dublin Fishers had plantations in Kildare, Queens, Cork and other counties, and possibly in southeast Dublin County. It is not clear what connections their descendants may have had to Fisher immigrants to Pennsylvania.

In 1642, when the Catholic population in Ireland rebelled against the English protestents, Oliver Cromwell did what the Crown had done before him -- he promised rewards to English "adventurers" who would serve in putting down the rebellion. The rebellion was stopped, and lands of most Catholic proprietors were confiscated and awarded to the adventurers, who rented tracts to a new wave of English settlers. It is this wave of English/Irish settlers (1642-1690) which included some Fishers who were among the earliest emigrants from Ireland to Pennsylvania.

Five Fishers are listed among the officers of Oliver Cromwell in Ireland in 1649 -- Thomas and William (may have served in Louth), Lt. John (served in Wexford), Lt. Richard (served in Cork), and Capt. Henry (served in Meath and Wexford). Thomas may have been "Thomas Fisher, gentleman" of Ballymascanlon, Ballyboyes, County Louth in the 1659 census of Ireland. In the same year in County Louth, Mary Fisher, daughter of William (a Quaker born in the Church of England in Elton in Cheshire) married William Archer (a Quaker of Lurgan and later Rosenallis). Her brother Joseph immigrated to Pennsylvania from Dublin in 1683. Thomas Fisher of County Louth died there in 1663, and any children are unknown. One of them could have been Thomas Fisher of southeast Dublin County, of which more follows.

Southeast Dublin County

Several Fisher families of southeast Dublin County appear in the early Quaker and Church of Ireland (Anglican) records. Joseph Fisher, a Quaker born at Elton in Thornton Le Moores parish in Cheshire, lived at Stillorgan as early as 1673, a few miles southeast of Dublin, and immigrated to Pennsylvania in 1683. The local Anglican church was at Monkstown, little more than a mile northeast of Joseph's home, near Dublin Bay. Thomas Fisher, an Anglican, lived near the church, in the small fishing village of Dun Leary (Dun Laoghaire). Robert and John Fisher lived about a mile to the southwest, at Leopardstown. Elizabeth Fisher and Thomas Robinson lived less than two miles to the southeast, at Carrickmaines. Another Thomas Fisher lived at Killiney, a fishing village three miles to the southeast on Killiney Bay. All may have come from the small fishing villages along the south bank of the Mersey River in Cheshire, across from Liverpool and a little upstream.

Stillorgan was the estate of William Wolferston, a Catholic, until it was consficated by the English after the rebellion of 1641/2 and the Cromwellian wars. It would then have been settled by the English, and consisted of only 166 acres. It was the site of Stillorgan Castle. Stillorgan was once in northern Kill Parish, but was later separated to become a small parish. In Joseph Fisher's time, the only residents of Stillorgan were his family, some of his wife's Newmarch family, and a few others. The small parishes of this area were administered together as the Union of Monkstown by 1669, with a single register being kept at the Monkstown church. Their burials were at the Carrickbrennan graveyard at Monkstown. The ruins of Monkstown Castle and the ancient cemetery are both at the present intersection of Monkstown Avenue and Carrickbrennan Road.

Elizabeth Fisher of Carrickmaine married Thomas Robinson of the same place, on May 4, 1672. The Civil Survey of 1654-56 shows that Carrickmaine had been the estate of Theobald Walsh, an Irish Catholic rebel in 1641/2. The land was settled by the English after the rebellion. Thomas Robinson and Elizabeth Fisher may have had roots in the village of Sutton in Eastham Parish, Cheshire, near Elton in Thornton-Le-Moores parish. Thomas Robinson of Sutton, son of George, was born 1636. Elizabeth (born 1638), Robert (born 1633), and John Fisher (born 1635), children of Robert (Sr.), were all born at Sutton. Thomas Robinson could have been Thomas, son of Thomas (d. Rathcoole, Dublin County 1672), or Thomas, son of Edward (d. 1672, Dublin.) Elizabeth (Fisher) Robinson died at Carrickmaine in Dublin County in September of 1679, and their newborn son Benjamin died at the same time. Thomas Robinson then disappeared from the Dublin County records. He may be the one who began to appear in the records of Chester County, Pennsylvania by 1688.

The Fishers and Robinsons of Dublin County were probably long-time friends and neighbors back in Cheshire. James Robinson, son of James, was born in 1598 at Elton, and a Thomas Robinson who died there in 1653 would have been a neighbor of the Fishers. More Robinsons appear in the records of the adjoining parishes near Elton, notably Sutton in Eastham parish. The Fishers and Robinsons of Leopardstown and Carrickmaine almost certainly came from Sutton. Benjamin Robinson of Sutton may have been a namesake of Benjamin, son of Elizabeth (Fisher) and Thomas Robinson in Dublin County. Robert, William and George Robinson of Sutton (probable brothers) all named sons Thomas between 1630 and 1636. George is probably one who went to Ireland. He joined the Quakers of Dublin for a short time, and notified them, in 1681, of his intention of going to America. The congregation produced testimony against him and failed to note any approval. Richard, a probable son, was warned of possible ejection in 1686. Thomas, widower of Elizabeth (Fisher) Robinson, apparently never left the Anglicans. In America, George settled by 1686 with wife Ann and supposed sons Thomas, James, Richard and John, "between Mill Creek and Calf Run" in Newcastle County (now in Delaware), not far from the line with Kennett Township in Chester County. This George Robinson may have been the father of George who emigrated from Ballymacrandal in Armagh in 1687, settling a little further east in Newcastle County on the opposite side of Brandywine Creek. William "Robertson," who came as a servant to Joseph Fisher in 1683, may have been William Robinson of the Newcastle County Robinsons.

John Robinson of Thomastown, Monkstown parish, was probably one of the Cheshire/Dublin Robinsons who emigrated to Pennsylvania. He had a son James born in 1684 in Thomastown, near the village of

Thomas Robinson and Elizabeth Fisher who married in 1672. This John Robinson may have been the same as the one who came with Katharine Robinson to Philadelphia in 1685, aboard the "Bristol Merchant," both being servants to Thomas Webb, a wealthy Dublin merchant. George Fisher came on the same ship, as a servant to Major Jaspar Farmer of County Cork.

Robert Fisher of Leopardstown, Tully Parish married Alice Worsdell (from the Leicestershire Worsdells?) in May of 1679. (Thomas Fisher of Dun Leary was married a day after Robert.) Alice was from Carrickmaine, the village of Thomas Robinson and his wife Elizabeth (Fisher) Robinson. Robert Fisher must have been a Quaker who returned to the Anglican Church of Ireland. On 7 May, 1685, his four elder children were all baptized together. These children had the same names as members of the nearby Quaker family of Joseph Fisher, who immigrated to Philadelphia (Joseph, Martha, Mary, Isabella).

John Fisher of Leopardstown married Abigail Williamson May 7, 1685, the same day that his brother Robert's children had their delayed baptisms. Jane, daughter of John Fisher of Leopardstown, Tully Parish, was born there in 1686. John moved to the nearby village of Glanagary in Monkstown Parish, near Dun Leary, where a son Thomas was christened March 11, 1688. John Fisher died at Glanagary in 1689. Abigail, widow of John Fisher, was probably the one who married David Ribton of Glanagary in 1691. The Ribtons of Ireland probably came from the Ribtons of Cumberland. Jane Fisher of Glanagary, probably Jane, daughter of John deceased, married Mr. William Lord in the City of Dublin in 1705. (The Williamson family of Marple, Chester County, Pennsylvania came from Budsworth, Cheshire, eight miles southeast of Elton, birthplace of Joseph Fisher of Dublin County and Philadelphia. Daniel Williamson of Chester County named one of his daughters Abigail in 1705.)

Henry Fisher, a farmer, died intestate at Leopardstown in 1698. Two possible sons were John and Henry, of Killiney and Leopardstown.

Thomas and Mary Fisher lived at Carrickmaine and Killiney. Thomas Fisher of Killiney died in March of 1707 at Killiney. Mary died in December of 1709 at Killiney. Their children were: Mary, daughter of Thomas Fisher, buried in December of 1679 at Leopardstown; Robert and Abigail, born 1681 and 1683 at Carrickmaine; and 7 children born at Killiney between 1691 and 1705: Esther, Abigail, Hannah, Catharine, (Unreadable), Ann, and Elisabeth. The will of Thomas Fisher is listed in the index at the National Archives in Dublin but was burned in the Civil War records fire of 1922.

Thomas Fisher and Rosamond Coaker were married May 4, 1679 in Monkstown Parish, both of Dun Leary. (Robert Fisher of Leopardstown was married the previous day.) Known children at Dun Leary were John, Thomas (baptized 30 April 1682 at Dun Leary), Henry, Ellinor, Elisabeth, and Margaret. Thomas (Sr.) of Dun Leary may have been descended from Thomas Fisher, son of William, christened September 29, 1633 at Manley, Frodsham Parish, a few miles from Elton, the birthplace of the immigrant Joseph Fisher. Thomas Fisher of Manley in Cheshire may have been the same as Thomas, a gentleman of Ballyboys, Ballymascanlan parish in County Louth in the census of 1659. He may have come to Ireland with the Cheshire Fishers. Mary Fisher, a daughter of William and Margaret Fisher of Elton in Cheshire, was married in County Louth in 1659.

Summary and Opinions

There were at least nine Thomas Fishers in Dublin County contemporary with Joseph Fisher of Stillorgan Parish and Philadelphia:

In St. Johns Parish, City of Dublin, possible relatives of Sir Edward Fisher, no indication that any went to America:

Thomas Fisher, son of William, christened February 22, 1634.

Thomas Fisher, resident by 1666.

Thomas Fisher, twin of James Fisher, born August 8, 1679, sons of John Fisher. (Probably the brothers who died in Queens County).

Thomas Fisher, son of Richard, born January 27, 1683. **Thomas Fisher**, resident with a wife Margaret by 1692.

In the Union of Monkstown, southeast Dublin County:

Thomas Fisher, baptized 30 April 1682, son of **Thomas** and Rosamond (Coaker) Fisher of Dun Leary (Dunleary, Dun Laoghaire), Monkstown Parish. Best candidate as immigrant to Pennsylvania? **Thomas Fisher**, baptized 11 March 1688, son of John and Abigail (Williamson) Fisher of Glanagary, Monkstown Parish. A good candidate as immigrant to Pennsylvania.

Thomas Fisher of Leopardstown by 1679, buried March 23 1707 at Killiney. Wife Mary buried at Killiney 27 December 1709. Ten children, no known son named Thomas.

Based upon my study of the Dublin County, Cheshire, and Pennsylvania records, I think Thomas Fisher's history may have been something like this: I think Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania was Thomas Jr. of Dun Leary. I think Thomas Robinson, widower of Elizabeth Fisher (relative of Thomas Fisher Sr.), immigrated to Mill Creek, Newcastle County, Pennsylvania (now Delaware) in 1682; that Joseph Fisher of Cheshire, Dublin County and Philadelphia was a relative of Thomas Fisher; and that Thomas Fisher Sr. immigrated, possibly to Chichester in Chester County, with his family before 1700. I think Thomas Fisher Sr. and most of his family may have died soon after 1701 in one of the yellow fever epidemics along the Delaware River. A notice of administration in January of 1701 for John (presumed eldest son, husband of Barbara), a hatter of Chichester, is the only surviving record that may be relevant.

After 1701, I think Thomas Fisher Jr. may have gone a few miles to the west-southwest of Chichester, to Mill Creek in northwest Newcastle County, to stay with Thomas and James Robinson, sons of George, late of Dublin (deceased by 1691). This was not far from the Kennett Township line of Chester County. James obtained a survey for his father's land at Mill Creek in 1702, and was a churchwarden at Immanuel Anglican Church in 1710. He later went to Kennett in Chester County, and may have lived on the Fisher farm. He may have been the namesake of James Fisher, son of Thomas and Elizabeth. Thomas Fisher joined the Quakers of Concord Monthly Meeting before 1713, and married Elizabeth Huntley in May of that year. I think Thomas Robinson died without surviving issue, at age 79, soon after his name was included in the tax assessment for the Kennett farm in 1715.

Descendancy Charts

The following descendancy charts are my best effort at sorting the Fisher families of Dublin County and the area around Elton and Sutton in Cheshire. Following the descendancy charts are maps showing the ancient villages and parishes of southeast Dublin County in Ireland, and locations of Joseph Fisher's lots in Philadelphia County in Pennsylvania. Records are given in the tables at the end of this chapter.

The Fishers of the Union of Monkstown, Southeast Dublin County, Ireland

The Irish/Anglican church & cemetery were at Monkstown. Quakers were at nearby Stillorgan. The 17th-century Fishers lived in Monkstown and within 2 miles of there, in parishes of :

Tully Parish -- Carrickmaine & Leopardstown Killiney Parish -- Killiney & Ballybrack Monkstown Parish -- Monkstown, Dun Leary & Glanagary. Stillorgan Parish -- Stillorgan Estate

Joseph Fisher, Quaker, immigrated to Pennsylvania from Stillorgan Parish in 1683:

Some Observations

All of the Fishers of northeast Philadelphia County apparently came from Ireland (Joseph, John, George, James and their families). When Thomas Fisher immigrated, he may have joined these Irish Fishers. In 1686 at Abington Monthly Meeting, near Sandy Run, James Fisher witnessed the marriage of Henry English & Hannah West. John Fisher, of Springfield Township nearby, had a plantation on Sandy Run and land close by in Upper Dublin Township, where Joseph Fisher's large tract was located. This John Fisher died between 8 December 1716 and 30 January 1717. His will mentioned a wife Katharine; eldest son John; youngest son Joseph (under age 21); eldest daughter Mary Regan, wife of Richard Regan; and youngest daughter Sarah Fisher. He left 200 acres in Upper Dublin Township (purchased from Nicholas Scull) and his plantation on Sandy Run. Nicholas Scull came from County Cork in 1685 on the same ship (the "Bristol Merchant") as George Fisher, the Farmer family of Cork, and other Irish immigrants. Jonathan Thatcher of the Chester County Thatchers was also aboard.

Other possible relatives of Thomas Fisher were John and Barbara Fisher of Chichester in Chester County, and John and Sarah Fisher of Kingsess near the mouth of the Shuylkill River in Philadelphia County.

At the time of the 1701 land grant in Kennett, Thomas Fisher (the elder) of Dunleary was probably about age 52 (his son Thomas being still under age, not quite 19). When Thomas Fisher of Chester County married Elizabeth Huntley in 1713, Thomas Fisher (the younger) of Dunleary was age 31. Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher was younger, probably age 21 at her marriage.

In Cheshire, tradition would have called for naming the first son after the paternal grandfather. Quakers were more informal but usually honored one of the grandfathers first. There was no strong tradition of naming children after the parents. I found no one in Pennsylvania named Rosamond (after the supposed mother of Thomas Fisher). My opinion about namesakes of the Kennett children:

William – For the maternal grandfather, William Huntley.

James – For James Robinson, who may have lived with the Fishers at Kennett. (A guess.)

Elizabeth – For her mother, Elizabeth Huntley Fisher; and/or her aunt Elizabeth Standfield Hope.

Samuel – For Samuel Stanfield, newly arrived from Ireland at this child's birth. (Or simply Biblical.)

Thomas – For his father, and/or paternal grandfather Thomas Fisher.

Francis – For his uncle Francis Huntley; great uncle Francis Chads; great grandfather Francis Standfield.

Mary – For her maternal grandmother, Mary (Standfield) Huntley.

Several other children apparently did not survive infancy (names unknown). I don't know who Susannah Fisher was, who attended several of the family weddings at Kennet.

The earliest Quakers of Pennsylvania practiced double-partible inheritance (double share for the eldest son), widow's thirds, and small legacies for children other than the eldest son. The Quakers changed to equal inheritance for heirs by the 1730's. If Thomas Fisher was Thomas of Dunleary, the Kennett land may have been intended for an elder brother John, who may have been the one who died in Chichester, Chester County in 1701.

Some Irish Associations

Thomas Robinson, of Tully Parish, Dublin County in Ireland, may have come to Philadelphia aboard the "Tryall," with Samuel Harrison of Dublin County. In 1664, a Thomas Robinson shipped from London to "New England" as a merchant on the "Tryall." In June of 1688 Thomas Robinson served on a jury in Chester County. In September of the same year, he was charged in the provincial court in Chester, Chester County, Pennsylvania concerning an altercation aboard the "Tryall." The record says "Thomas Robins (Robinson) and Thomas Woodmans (Woodmansee or Woodmanson) being convicted before John Bristow for drunkenness, breach of peace, breaking ye great cabin door and ye head of Samuel Harrison, mate on board of ye Ship Tryall was for ye same called to ye bar but upon their submission to ye Court was ordered to pay 5s/ with all court charges." The injured mate, Samuel Harrison, came from Dublin, Ireland and settled on the east side of the Delaware in West Jersey. (The "Tryall" made at least 30 Atlantic crossings by the time of its last known trip in 1736. Over half the trips embarked from (or near) Bristol.)

Two of the older children of Thomas Fisher, of Chester County, married Irish immigrants from near Belfast. James married Alice Stanfield, daughter of Samuel Stanfield and Jane (Andrew) Stanfield, who came from Lurgan Monthly Meeting, at the lower end of Lake Neagh near Belfast in northern Ireland. Elizabeth married Joseph Wilkinson, who came from Ballynacree in Antrim County, northeast Ireland. Ballynacree More and Beg (large and small) are adjoining townlands in the parish of Ballymoney, about 40 miles northwest of Belfast. There was a monthly meeting of the Quakers in Antrim Parish and also at Ballynacree.

Some of the Robinsons of Chester, Newcastle and Kent counties in Pennsylvania/Delaware are known to have come from Ireland, and some of their descendants lived in Concord, Birmingham and Kennett townships in Chester County where Thomas and Elizabeth Fisher and her relatives were active. A teen-age Thomas Robinson, probably born in 1682, began a term of indenture in 1695 with Nathaniel Newlin of Concord Township. The Newlins had immigrated from Mountmellick in Rosenallis Parish, Queens County, Ireland, 45 miles west southwest of Dublin, the same place where Joseph Fisher's sister Martha was married in 1665. Both Joseph Fisher and the Newlins immigrated in 1683.

The Harland family, close neighbors of Thomas Fisher in Kennett, came from County Down in northeast Ireland, but were originally from Durham, England.

Henry Hollingsworth, who surveyed the Thomas Robinson/Thomas Fisher tract in Chester County in 1701, immigrated with Joseph Fisher and Robert Turner of Dublin County, Ireland. The Hollingsworths were related to the Andrew family of Ireland, as was Thomas Fisher's daughter-in-law Alice Stanfield Fisher.

Zerobabel Thatcher, a neighbor of Thomas Fisher in Kennett, was a probable son of Jonathan Thatcher, who came in 1685 aboard the same ship as George Fisher of Ireland.

When Thomas Fisher wrote his will in Caln Township, Chester County, Pennsylvania in 1747, two Irish immigrants were witnesses. Thomas Paine was from Durrow near Kilkenny, southwest of Dublin. William Pim was from County Laois (Leix/Queens) in the same area.

My own Fisher grandfather was Florance Clinton Fisher (1886 - 1966), descendant of Thomas Fisher of Chester County. He related a family tradition which I will repeat here, although I have avoided any assumption that it is correct. My grandfather told me that, as a boy in Iowa, he had seen old family records going back to Ireland, which were left outdoors in a trunk and were ruined. When he was about 9 years old, his own grandfather (Cephas Fisher Jr.) told him about his Irish ancestors shortly before his death in 1895. The story was that an estate of some consequence was seized for taxes in Ireland, and that the ancestors had come to Ireland from England. Since he was descended from James Fisher, son of Thomas, he had English-Irish ancestors from the north of Ireland, via Alice Stanfield, wife of James Fisher. This could have been

the real family memory rather than the Fisher line, but I now tend to believe the Iowa generation did know the complete history (now forgotten except for modern research).

Thomas Fisher and Thomas Robinson may have met James Standfield due to the merchant business of Joseph Fisher, immigrant from Stillorgan (Union of Monkstown), Dublin County, Ireland. The Joseph Fisher waterfront lot in Philadelphia was only three berths above that of James Standfield and his brigantine "Betsy." James Standfield was an uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, who became the wife of the younger Thomas Fisher of Kennett, Chester County. Thomas Fisher (Sr.) of Dun Leary was of middle age when James Standfield died in 1699. Thomas Fisher (Jr.) was age 17.

Joseph and George Fisher

Fisher families lived along both banks of the Mersey River in England, as early as the reign of Henry VIII. On the Lancashire side, Fishers appear by 1588 in the parish records of Liverpool, and within a few decades appeared in many other parishes of the area. On the Cheshire side of the river, Fisher families can be found in the parish records as early as 1567.

The Fishers of Thornton le Moors Parish, on the Cheshire side of the Mersey, were ancestors of Joseph Fisher of Stillorgan, Union of Monkstown in Dublin County, Ireland, and therefore were also possible relatives of Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania. Thornton le Moors is a parish in the hundred of Eddisbury, county of Chester, comprising the townships of Dunham, Elton, Hapsford, Thornton in the Moors, and Wimbolds-Trafford. The Gowey, a tributary stream to the Mersey, runs through the parish. Thornton in the Moors is 6 ½ miles north-northeast of the city of Chester.`

The Fishers of Elton were there until at least 1642. William Fisher of Elton was father of John (born and died 1598), Ellen (born 1600), John (born 1603), Hannah (born 1617), Abigail (born 1620), Deborah (born and died 1627), Margaret (died 1631), Marie (born 1633), Joseph (born 1635), Mary (born 1637), Deborah (born 1642), and Martha (birthdate unknown). This could be two families, or children of two marriages of William Fisher.

On August 25, 1625, William Fisher married Dorothy Widdens (sometimes read Widness) of Stoke, a village in Stoke Parish 3 miles southwest of Elton. He was a churchwarden at Stoke from 1642 to 1647. His wife Dorothy died there in 1648, and he is not mentioned in the Stoke register after that. He may have been a relative of the Elton Fishers.

Margaret Fisher was the mother of at least the last four of William Fisher's children. The son Joseph, christened February 7, 1635 at Elton, was mentioned later in the Quaker records of Dublin as the son of William and Margaret Fisher of Elton in Cheshire. The Dublin Quaker records also mention the daughters Mary and Martha. The other children were not mentioned in the Dublin Quaker records.

A search was made in parishes along the Mersey River in England for possible relatives of the Dublin County Fishers. It appears that if the Quaker immigrant Joseph Fisher was related to the Anglican Fishers who were his neighbors in Dublin County, they were probably cousins. Robert Fisher of Thornton and Dunham in Thornton le Moores Parish was probably a relative. Robert was father of Elizabeth (born 1605), Margaret (born 1610), and John (born 1613). Another possible relative was Robert Fisher of Eastham, born in 1633, son of Robert. Eastham was about 3 miles downstream from Elton near the Mersey River. There were early Fishers at Heswell and Bebington (8 miles NW of Thornton), and in the city of Chester.

The Fishers of Elton became Quakers by 1659, and moved to Ireland to join the English Quakers there. They were among the first generation of converts to Quakerism, which sprang from the teachings of George Fox around 1650. William Penn had interests in southern Ireland and became a supporter of the Quaker movement while living in Ireland. It is known that the Fishers of Elton, Cheshire settled on the south side of Dublin, but they went first to other places under the care of the English - Irish Quakers. Mary Fisher,

daughter of William and Margaret of Elton in Cheshire, married William Archer at County Louth, on the east coast but northward from Dublin, 9 month (November) of 1659, recorded at Dublin Monthly Meeting. Martha Fisher, daughter of William and Margaret, married the widower Robert Turner of Dublin but born in Yorkshire. They were married at Rosenallis in Mountmellick Parish, to the southwest of Dublin in Queens County, on the $10^{\rm th}$ of the seventh month (September), 1665; recorded at Dublin Monthly Meeting. In 1662 Robert Turner, son of Robert & Mary of Read End, Royston in Hertfordshire, married Elizabeth Ruddock from Dover.

Margaret Fisher of Elton in Cheshire died in 1669 at Dublin, recorded at Dublin Monthly Meeting. Joseph Fisher, son of William and Margaret of Elton in Cheshire, may have been the one who married, in 1656, Bridgett Coddington at St. Michan's, City of Dublin. If so, his known marriage was his second, to Isabel Newmarch 6 February 1671, recorded at Dublin Monthly Meeting. Moses Fisher, son of Joseph and Isabel, was born 20 November 1671 at Rathfarnham, Dublin County, recorded at Dublin Monthly Meeting. Joseph Fisher Jr., son of Joseph and Isabel of Stillorgan, County Dublin, was born 1673, 2-9, recorded at Dublin Monthly Meeting.

Stillorgan and Rathfarnum, parishes where Joseph Fisher lived, lie near to each other on the south side of Dublin. Stillorgan was one of the seven parishes that were administered together beginning in 1670 as the Union of Monkstown. The parishes were Monkstown, Dalkey, Killiney, Tully, Stillorgan, Kilmacud, and Kill of the Grange (now in Kill parish). The survey of 1654-1656 shows that Stillorgan had been an estate in the northern end of Kill parish, belonging to the Catholic proprietor William Woulferston of Stillorgan, who supported the Irish in the rebellion of 1652. Stillorgan and most of the other estates of the area were consficated by the English. Joseph Fisher and his relatives were part of a new wave of English settlers who came after the rebellion. The Stillorgan estate, with a castle, lies in the parish of that name which was created from part of Kill parish. Any records relating to Joseph Fisher's residency in Stillorgan were probably destroyed when the Dublin records building was burned in the civil war in 1922. The Stillorgan estate, which consisted of only 166 acres, may have been in the tenancy of Robert Turner or his brother-in-law, Joseph Fisher.

Stillorgan, where Joseph Fisher lived by 1673, was given as the last residence of Joseph Fisher in Ireland when he immigrated to Philadelphia in 1683. The Fishers would have had to go from Dublin to Liverpool to embark. The Francis Standfield family were at Garston near Liverpool preparing to embark on the "Endeavor" at the same time. The "Lion" of Liverpool arrived 14, 8 month (October) 1683 with members of the Turner and Fisher families. Robert Turner, late of Dublin, merchant, brought a child Martha and a number of servants (including the surveyor Henry Hollingsworth, who surveyed the Thomas Robinson/Thomas Fisher tract in Chester County in 1701). The Fisher group included Joseph Fisher and "Elizabeth Fisher" his wife (sic Isobel, confirmed by the 1683 Quaker certificate of departure), late of Stillorgan near Dublin, in Ireland, yeoman, born in Elton in Cheshire, their children Moses, Joseph, Mary, and Martha, and a number of servants.

Two years after the immigration of Joseph Fisher, George Fisher immigrated from Ireland with the Jaspar Farmer family. George Fisher was probably related to Joseph Fisher. The Farmers came from Gerranekinnefeake, a parish on the northeast end of Cork harbor in southern Ireland. The Farmers had been Quakers at the Youghal Monthly Meeting, about 25 miles from Gerranekinnefeake, as early as 1669. (Another Jasper Farmer was at Ardevelane in Ireland, as late as 1715.) They came on the "Bristol Merchant," which arrived on the 10th of the 9th month (November) of 1685. Passengers included the families of Jasper Farmer, Sr. and Jr. of Cork, and a number of servants including George Fisher. Family members of Jasper Farmer Sr. were Mary Farmer, widow; Edward Farmer, Edward Batsford, Sarah Farmer, John Farmer, Robert Farmer, Katherine Farmer, and Charles Farmer. Jasper Farmer, Junior's family included Thomas Farmer, Katherine Farmer, widow, Elizabeth Farmer, and Katherine Farmer, Junior. It should be noted that the passenger lists for this period, in the "History of Chester County," are not at all complete. For example, the will of Ellish Lincolne was signed on board during George Fisher's trip on the "Bristol Merchant," witnessed by Michael Booth. Neither are listed. (Deborah Booth is listed as coming on the "Lion" with Joseph Fisher.)

The Fishers of Stillorgan/Monkstown were associated with the Farmer family of Cork, and therefore most probably were related to George Fisher who immigrated with the Farmers. Jasper Farmer, a Quaker, was married to the widow Katherine Batsford July 6, 1674 at Garraneskinnefeake, a parish on the inner bay of the city of Cork. Joseph Fisher Jr. of Stillorgan was married in Pennsylvania to Mary Farmer, daughter of Jasper Farmer of Cork.

George Fisher who bought a "kitchen and half a lot" in the city of Chester, Chester County in 1688 was probably not the Irish George. He was probably George, born in 1667 to Dennis and Susannah Fisher of St. Thomas, Portsmouth in Hampshire but later of Salem in West New Jersey. The Irish George Fisher was the one who, with Edward Farmer in late 1696, witnessed the will of Thomas Terwood of Philadelphia County, one of Joseph Fisher's servants. Joseph Fisher(Sr.) was executor, and legatees included members of Joseph Fisher's family.

Joseph Fisher and Robert Turner were brothers-in-law, Robert having married Martha Fisher, sister of Joseph. They were business partners and "first purchasers" of land from William Penn. In May of 1682, they bought (in England) 10,000 acres in Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, 5000 acres each. Their large forested investment tracts became part of Upper Dublin Township, northeast Philadelphia County. They settled on adjoining tracts near Byberry in southeast Philadelphia County. They had adjoining dock lots on the Philadelphia riverfront for their merchant business, bounded on the north by Mulberry Street. Jasper Farmer, Irish brother-in-law of Joseph Fisher Jr., took his county land in Whitemarsh, southwest of Upper Dublin Township, extending to the Schuylkill River. Joseph Fisher belonged to the Quaker meeting at Byberry, Philadelphia County.

The will of Joseph Fisher (Sr.) of Dublin Township, Philadelphia County was written 12 Dec 1711 and probated 21 Jan 1714. He gave 500 acres to son Joseph who was at that time without a son, mentions Isobel, daughter of son Joseph; sister's daughter Mary Archer; three thousand acres in Upper Dublin Township to son Joseph; sisters' daughter Martha Bell L100; witnesses Daniel Davis, John Swift and Edward Farmer. There was no mention of a wife (presumed deceased).

The will of Joseph Fisher (Jr.) of Dublin Township, County of Philadelphia, was written 23 October 1717, and probated 2 December 1717. It was dictated to John Swift of Philadelphia and Edward Farmer of White Marsh, Philadelphia County; mentions daughter Isobel Fisher, 800 acres adjoining Hartsquake at upper end of tract; daughter Mary the plantation that Joshua Holt now dwells on containing 1100 acres at lower end of tract; daughter Martha 1100 acres near Mary's tract; remainder to wife (Mary) and children; brother Farmer (assumed to be Edward).

** Other Possibilities **

Thomas Fisher of Bristol (b. 1691)

If the Irish pedigree for the Fishers of Chester County should prove to be incorrect, the Fishers of Bristol should be studied. Thomas Fisher of Chester County could have come from the Fishers of Bristol and the surrounding areas of Gloucestershire and Somerset. James Wallis, a trading merchant of Bristol, England, and Thomas Fisher, suspected seaman or trading merchant, both claimed their adjoining tracts in Kennett at the same time, around the beginning of 1700. Thomas Fisher and Francis Fisher, shipping merchants of Bristol, made voyages to America between 1685 and 1715. John Fisher, another shipping merchant who made trips to America, was probably also from Bristol. There are Fishers in the Quaker records of Bristol and also in the parish records.

In 1670, the will of John Maplett of the City of Bath (near Bristol) mentioned a house bought from Mr. Thomas Fisher. John Maplett's will shows that he had a sister Mary Gorton in "New England." Thomas Fisher of Bristol owned the ship "Constant Martha," and in 1678 had an agent in Maryland. He sponsored a number of endentured bondsmen who emigrated from Bristol. Thomas Fisher, son of Thomas and Sarah

Fisher, was born at Bath on 28 Jul 1691. In 1702, Thomas Fisher witnessed the will of Francis Holland in the City of Bristol.

The early Fishers of Bristol were merchants. William, a butcher, died in 1621. Edward, a clothier, died in 1661 leaving known sons Edward, Joseph, a clothier who died in 1677, John, and James. Francis, a dealer in fine cloth, died in 1702, and had a brother William. James, a grocer who died in 1718, had a son John. Another Francis made numerous Atlantic crossings as a shipper between 1685 and 1715. No early Bristol will has been found for any Thomas Fisher.

There is an interesting coincidence of death dates that could indicate a connection between James Fisher and James Wallis, both of Bristol. James Wallis of Bristol, who applied for land in Kennett at the same time as Thomas Fisher and Thomas Robinson, may have died on the same day as James Fisher of Bristol. James Fisher of Bristol died 5 February 1718, and an administrator was named 10 February 1718 for James Wallis of Bristol for land in Newcastle County, Delaware. A group of James Wallis's trading partners died at the same time.

The will of James Fisher of Bristol, dated 1702/1718, did not mention a son Thomas. It is plausible that there was a son Thomas, not mentioned because he was already situated in Pennsylvania or because he had become a Quaker. I did not complete a thorough search of the parish records of Bristol, Gloucestershire and Somerset.

Thomas Fisher of Garston Near Liverpool (b. 1668)

In 1683 Francis Standfield, grandfather of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher of Chester County, arrived in Pennsylvania aboard the "Endeavor" of Liverpool. Francis was said to have come from "Garton in Cheshire." This may have been a mistake for Garston, on the Lancashire side of the Mersey River near Liverpool. The Standfields had lived in Cheshire, but Garston may have been a brief stop before embarkation from Liverpool. Cheshire was just across the river from Garston, and the Cheshire sites associated with the Standfields (Marple, Marthall, and Congleton) were all within 25 miles or less from Garston. The best English place name books and old parish maps show no such place as Garton in Cheshire, at any time in history. If the Standfields were at the tiny village of Garston in 1683, they would have met the Fishers there.

By 1657 a Thomas Fisher lived in the parish of Childwall on the north bank of the Mersey River, between Liverpool and Manchester, in the part of Lancashire which is now Merseyside. The Childwall parish records show the birth of Thomas, son of Thomas Fisher, baptised 7 April 1668. The mother was probably Catharine (Dwarrihouse) Fisher, who married Thomas Fisher in Childwall Parish in 1657. Thomas Fisher (the elder) of Garston died in 1678, leaving the younger Thomas Fisher an orphan at age 10. Six years later, it was probably the same Thomas Fisher who embarked from Liverpool with the Baker family who settled in Bucks Couty, Pennsylvania.

In 1684 the Quaker Henry Baker of Walton-on-the Hill, a short distance from Garston, contracted with a number of local people to join him in passage to Pennsylvania. Thomas Fisher signed up for an indenture of 4 years for passage with the Bakers. This was probably Thomas Fisher (the younger) of Garston, age 16. The Bakers settled in Bucks County, Pennsylvania and their records are very complete. Thomas Fisher, John Hurst and Joseph Stedman, fellow indentured workers for the Bakers, are not mentioned in Bucks County but these names did show up later in Chester County. Nathan Baker, youngest son of Henry, moved to Concord Monthly Meeting in 1706, where Thomas Fisher married Elizabeth Huntley in 1713.

Shortly after the Baker's arrival in Bucks County, Henry Baker apparently sold one or more of the service bonds to Francis Standfield of Marple, Chester County. Chester County court records show that by July of 1685, John Hurst was in service to Francis Standfield. It is reasonable to suppose that the bond of Thomas Fisher of Garston may have also been sold to the Standfields, since the Fishers and Standfields later were linked by marriage in Chester County. Joseph Stedman may have been a son of one by the same name who

had already emigrated and obtained land in Springfield Township, Chester County by 1683, not far from the Standfields of Marple Township.

Thomas Fisher of Garston would have been age 45 in 1713 when Thomas Fisher of Chester County married Elizabeth Huntley. Such a marriage was possible, but since there is no sign of any earlier family in Pennsylvania or thereabouts it is more likely that he died or returned to England long before 1713. If this is the right family, the Thomas Fisher of 1713 would perhaps be a son of the elder Thomas, who could have returned and claimed his father's Kennett land.

The Heald and Fisher families, close neighbors in Kennett, settled at about the same time, in 1714. Samuel Heald's mother, Jane (Dunbabin) Heald, was from Great Sankey, a village on the Mersey River a short distance upstream from Garston. Richard Fletcher, second spouse of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher's mother Mary (Standfield) Huntley in Kennett, was from the same area on the Mersey River.

Problems with the Garston theory: No records were found in England or elsewhere to directly support the guess. The family names in Chester County do not match well with the names of the Garston Fishers.

Thomas Fisher of Barbados (b. 1689)

There was a Thomas Fisher in the British military garrison on Barbados, in 1679. Nothing was found to identify him positively with Thomas and Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher of Chester County.

In 1715 Thomas Fisher, age 26, was enumerated in the parish of St. Philips, at the east end of the island. In the same year he witnessed the will of Andrew Dunken of the same parish. In the same census, Elizabeth Fisher, age 40, and William Fisher, age 59, were also enumerated in St. Philips parish. Born about 1689, Thomas would have been of age 23 or 24 in 1713 when the Chester County Thomas married Elizabeth Huntley. The census of 1715 was meant to be an enumeration of inhabitants, so if this was Thomas of Chester County, he was maintaining residency in both places, which seems improbable.

It is intriguing that there was a William Huntley family of St. Philips, discussed in my book about the Huntleys. William Huntley married Elizabeth Cowe, daughter of John Cowe, had several children, and died in 1679. A final possible correlation is that a Thomas Robinson, possibly the same as the one who was cowarrantee with Thomas Fisher for land in Kennett, witnessed the will of Thomas Locksmith in 1701 in Barbados, and owed money to the estate of Sarah Lynley in 1705.

Ebeneazor Langford/Langston/Langford, who lived across the road in Marple from Francis and Grace Standfield, was from Barbados and/or Antigua. William Webb, neighbor of the Fishers in Chester County, made trips to Barbados. The brigantine "Betsy," belonging to James Standfield, uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, was loaded with rum and molasses (among other things) when his estate was inventoried, probably from Barbados.

Thomas Fisher of Nanticoke River (b. ca. 1690)

There were numerous Fishers in Maryland before 1700. In 1706, William Fisher and wife Mary had a son born by the name of Joseph, in St. Stephens parish, Cecil County. Cecil County is in the northeast corner of Maryland, abutting Chester County, Pennsylvania.

Two brothers, Edward and William Fisher lived on the Nanticoke River in Maryland, at a place called Fisher's Landing (now called Lewis Landing). They died there in 1701 and 1702 respectively. William had a son Thomas, still a minor in 1703, and several daughters. The inheritance meant for Thomas was taken up by the sisters and assigned in 1714 to the widow of their uncle, Edward Fisher. Thomas disappeared. He probably died, but I considered the possibility that he went to Pennsylvania. I gave up the theory but there is one more connection – Edward Fisher sold a large tract in Sussex County, Delaware in

1700, and Thomas Fisher of Sussex County acted as agent for Edward. This may be only because Thomas, son of John and Margaret, was registrar of lands in Sussex County at the time.

James Standfield, uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania was agent in Maryland for Charles Pickering of Philadelphia.

Alexander Frazier from Maryland had land in Kennet Township, Chester County. Ralph Fishbourne moved from Maryland to Philadelphia before 1700, then to Chester County.

Nothing was found to support a positive connection between the Fishers of Maryland and Thomas Fisher of Chester County.

John and Margaret Fisher of Philadelphia and Sussex County

I hesitate to include this one, since it is now known without doubt that Thomas, son of John and Margaret Fisher, was not the same as Thomas Fisher of Chester County. However, there are correlations between the Standfields and these Fishers.

The accounting of James Standfield's estate, done by his brother-in -law Frances Chadsey between 1699 and 1707, refers to several trips to Sussex County to settle with the "two Fishers." Philadelphia court records show that Francis had sold James Standfield's large land holding in Sussex County to William and Thomas Fisher of Sussex County. The land, on Delaware Bay, was between that of John and Margaret Fisher's heirs and that of William Fisher further up the bay. John Fisher is also mentioned.

The Standfield account contains a reference to James Standfield's interest in the house of Samuel Atkins, son-in-law of John and Margaret Fisher. Philadelphia land records show that the house was very likely the same as the one where John and Margaret spent the winter of 1682, on the banks of the Delaware near the Philadelphia docks. James Standfield appears to have died in the Atkins house, as the accounting includes a charge for a doctor to come there.

It is then clear that James Standfield, uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, had some ties with the Fishers of Sussex County, who were from the neighborhood of Clitheroe in Lancashire and apparently from the Marsden Monthly Meeting.

No records have been found to show how Thomas Fisher of Chester County might have been related to John and Margaret Fisher, if they were in fact related.

III. Thomas Fisher of Kennett

The earliest known record of Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania is a land warrant from William Penn dated March 6, 1701, for 300 acres "near the Brandywine." The warrant was a joint one for Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher, and subsequent records show that it was in the northeast part of the township of Kennett, lying a little to the west of the Brandywine in the part of Kennett that later became Pennsbury.

William Penn arrived on his second voyage to Pennsylvania in 1699, aboard the "Endeavor." While in Philadelphia, he granted the 300 acres in Kennett, Chester County "near the Brandywine" to Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher, then returned soon after to Bristol, England where his wife Hannah was staying with her parents, the Callohills. Two of the Penn sons were born there, recorded in the Bristol Monthly Meeting records. At that time, relatives of a Francis Fisher were members of the same meeting, but were probably not related to Thomas Fisher. (Bristol emigrants generally went to Maryland or Virginia.)

Thomas Robinson, and the early landowners who acquired tracts near that of Robinson and Fisher, are of primary importance in searching for clues regarding Thomas Fisher's origins. The documents and maps on the following page show the location of the Robinson/Fisher tract and other tracts claimed by 1704. The maps were constructed from original Pennsylvania warrants and surveys, with added data from deeds, court records and genealogies. Gilbert Cope's 1911 deed map, which showed a much later land history, was used as a guide in placing the surveys. One version of the map shows the origin of the landowners in England. Another shows the landowners at the time of Thomas Fisher's early years in Kennett (1714-1718). A final version shows the neighbors of Thomas Fisher in 1739, at the time he obtained a re-survey and patent.

Histories of the tracts at the east end of Kennet and their owners, to the extent discovered in researching this book, are included in Chapter VI of this book.

Some of the first land claims in Kennett predated most of the now existing land records, but are sometimes mentioned in later records. The first land purchases in Pennsylvania were made in England in 1681, with the exact location of such land often to be assigned later. The purchasers sometimes never emigrated. They sold the land for profit, through agents in the colony, or deeded parts to heirs and associates. The first known survey in Kennett was in 1686, for Francis Smith. The land, a 500-acre purchase and a 200-acre Old Rent tract, was on Pocopsing Creek, at the northeast extreme of the original Kennett boundaries and only about a half-mile northward from the land that would later be taken up by Fisher and Robinson.

In 1699 William Penn granted a warrant to his daughter Leticia, for 30,000 acres – taking in the greater part of Kennett (excepting the east end near the Brandywine) as well as part of New Castle County and all of the present township of New Garden. This land, called "Letitia's Manor," was then sold off in parts. The Fisher/Robinson land was just to the east of this.

The Robinson/Fisher tract was granted at Philadelphia under William Penn's "Old Rights" provisions for purchasers, requiring a purchase price and an annual quitrent payment of one shilling per hundred acres. There is no indication that this was a "first purchase" made in England or Ireland, and no first purchaser headright land for masters and servants is mentioned.

In December of 1700, a tract of 515 acres in Kennet Township, Chester County was granted by warrant from William Penn to James Wallis, a seagoing merchant of Bristol, England. A few months later, William Penn granted a warrant dated 6 March, 1701 for 300 acres adjoining on the east side of the Wallis tract, to Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher. Henry Hollingsworth, formerly of Ireland, surveyed the Wallis tract 27 March, 1701, and the Robinson/Fisher tract 10 December, 1701. The 1701 Robinson/Fisher warrant was for a tract already staked out and claimed by them, and the survey was made in December of that year. The land may have been claimed or occupied for some years before 1701 by Thomas Robinson or Thomas Fisher. The Wallis survey refers to the adjoining "land of Thomas Robinson." The Robinson/Fisher warrant reads as follows:

"William Penn Absolute Proprietary & Governor in Chief of the Province of Pensilvania and Counties Annexed ... At the Request of Thomas Robinson and Thomas ffisher That I would grant them to take up three hundred Acres of Land near Brandywine Creek in Such manner as Shall hereafter be agreed on These are to require thee forthwth to Survey or cause to be Survey'd to them the Sd Number of three hundred Acres of Land not yet Survey'd nor concealed nor Seated by the Indians and make Return thereof into my Secretaries Office. Given under my hand and Seal at Philadelphia the Sixth of ye first Month 1700/01. Wm Penn. To Edward Penington Surveyor General of the Province of Pensilvania and Territories." (Note: Concealed lands were those reserved for the proprietors.)

The Robinson/Fisher survey of 1701 is now lost, but Thomas Fisher's resurvey in 1739, pursuant to a patent, survives. The resurvey shows that the tract was in the Township of Kennett, Chester County, in the part that later became Pennsbury, north of the old Kennett Quaker meeting house that was built in 1710. The tract, estimated by Henry Hollingsworth in 1701 to be 300 acres, was found to be only 200 acres at the time of the 1739 survey. The new survey was done "according to the ancient bounds," which if correct means there was simply an error in the original estimate. But it appears that the top of the Wallis and Robinson/Fisher tracts were lopped off in 1714 and given to Ezekiel Harland (75 acres from the Wallis tract and 100 acres from the Robinson/Fisher tract), when a number of surveys were aligned with the bottom of Robert Way's 1709 survey. If the alignment had been with the top of the Benjamin Chambers tract (see map), it would agree with the original Wallis survey and the Fisher tract would have remained 300 acres rather than 200.

In 1702, the Wallis tract adjoining Robinson and Fisher in Kennett was sold to John Smith, clock maker of Chester County. This John Smith may have been the same as the one who moved from Chester County to Cecil County, Maryland in 1706 with his father William Smith. If so, the immigration of another Thomas Fisher could be of special interest. William Smith was connected somehow to the Henry Baker family who brought a Thomas Fisher as one of his servants in 1684. William Smith was the owner of a tract in Concord which went to Nathan Baker, son of Henry Baker, immigrant on the "Vine" from Walton in Lancashire near Liverpool. William Smith and Nathan Baker both went to Cecil County, Maryland, where William died in 1708. James Robinson Jr., possibly a brother of Thomas Robinson, was an appraiser for the estate of William Smith. In 1708 John Smith, executor for his father, conveyed with Rachel (Baker) (Bunting) Cowgill, two tracts in the township of Concord to Nathan Baker, brother of Rachel, formerly of Lancashire. John Smith died soon after his father. The relationship between the Bakers and Fishers of Lancashire (Liverpool area) and Pennsylvania is still not clear. The Wallis and Robinson/Fisher tracts were both surveyed at about the same time by Henry Hollingsworth, the Irish surveyor of Chester County who at that time was also surveying the new Nottingham township and tracts extending into Cecil County, Maryland.

Thomas Fisher of Concord and Kennett in Chester County, Pennsylvania was a Quaker by May of 1713, when he proposed marriage at Concord Monthly Meeting to Elizabeth Huntley, daughter of William Huntley and Mary Standfield Huntley. The record says they were both members of Concord meeting, implying that this Thomas had not been living on the Kennett tract, where he would have been a member of Kennett (Newark) Monthly Meeting. When Thomas finally requested a patent for the tract in 1739, he had to pay a purchase consideration of 87 pounds 13 shillings plus 38 years of back quit-rent to the sons of William Penn. The quit-rent in arrears was paid to the receiver-general James Steel on January 17, 1739 at William Penn's "old purchase" rate of one shilling per hundred acres per year, amounting to 76 shillings (3 pounds 16 shillings).

Thomas and Elizabeth Fisher prospered on the Kennet farm and had known children William, James, Elizabeth, Samuel, Francis (male), Thomas, and Mary. They appear many times in the Quaker records of Newark Monthly Meeting (Kennet), which include marriage certificates for James, William and Elizabeth. In 1742 they moved to East Caln, still in Chester County, where they were members of Bradford Monthly Meeting. Samuel, Thomas and Francis were married at New Garden Monthly Meeting. Mary married at Uwchlan Monthly Meeting. The family history is documented in "Descendants and Ancestors of Cephas Fisher Jr." and other references, available at the Mormon Family History Library at Salt Lake City, Utah.

An excerpt from "Ancestors and Descendants of Cephas Fisher Jr.," with revisions to reflect new findings:

Thomas Fisher married Elizabeth Huntley between April 13 and May 6, 1713, at the Concord meeting house, Chester County, Pennsylvania. Her parents were William Huntley and Mary Standfield, who were married in 1692 at Concord Monthly Meeting. Elizabeth was born about 1692, apparently the eldest of five William Huntley children.

Thomas and Elizabeth moved their Quaker membership to the west side of Brandywine Creek in early 1714. In January of 1714, Thomas Fisher requested a certificate from Concord Men's Meeting for himself and wife, from Concord to Kennett (Newark Monthly Meeting). It is not known if they had settled on the Robinson/Fisher tract in the previous year. It is not known if Thomas had been a member of Kennett (Newark) meeting at any earlier time. Kennett meeting records show that their son William was born in May of 1714. Elizabeth Fisher requested a similar certificate from the Concord Women's Meeting for herself, to Newark Monthly Meeting.

All the Fisher children must have been born at Kennett, but the Fishers do not appear in the meeting minutes between 1714 and 1728, and only William's birth was recorded. At Kennett, the Fishers were surrounded by Elizabeth's relatives. Her sisters Deborah, Mary and Sarah Huntley all married at Kennett, and her only brother, Frances Huntley, died there, apparently unmarried, in 1723. A number of Elizabeth's Standfield aunts and cousins lived within a few miles of the Fisher farm. Elizabeth (Standfield) (Hope) Horn, Hannah (Standfield) Few and some of the Few cousins lived in Kennett. Grace (Standfield) (Chads) Stevenson and some Chads cousins lived across the Brandywine, at the ford in Birmingham Township. Sarah (Standfield) Bennett lived in Thornbury Township, just east of Birmingham. Deborah (Standfield) Woodward also lived in Thornbury.

The minor Huntley children were supposed to go to Thomas and Elizabeth Hope and Edward and Sarah Bennett when William Huntley died in 1708, but unfortunately Thomas Hope also died only a few weeks after William Huntley. The widow Elizabeth (Standfield) Hope married William Horne in 1709 and stayed at Kennett. The widow Mary (Standfield) Huntley returned briefly to Marple and then to Birmingham Township in 1709, probably staying with the Bennetts. When her daughter Elizabeth married in 1713, Mary married Richard Fletcher and lived on his land adjoining the south side of the former Huntley land in Kennett.

Children mentioned in Thomas Fisher's will were William, James, Elizabeth, Samuel, Thomas, Francis and Mary.

Susannah Fisher, who was at the weddings of the two oldest children, was probably another of the older children, born about 1717. She may have died before 1740.

Thomas Fisher would have been called upon to help when the Kennett meeting house was remodeled in 1719. Elizabeth suffered the loss of her only brother, Francis, in 1723. Elizabeth visited her home meeting of Concord in 1716, to attend the wedding of Samuel Painter and Elizabeth Buxcey, and Thomas accepted a civil appointment in 1725, as overseer of the poor in Kennett Township. The last Huntley sister was married off in 1727. The Fishers managed to avoid any controversy or transgression that would have brought them mention in the meeting records

of this period. Most of the Fisher birth records are missing, but there is a record of the oldest son William's 1714 birth date, which was entered years later, after his death. Thomas Fisher's tax rates for Kennett Township have been found for many of the years from 1715 until he moved to East Caln in 1742. (Colonial tax records for Chester County after 1740 are lost.)

A Thomas Fisher was on the tax list for Haverford Township in 1732. John Fisher of the London Grove list in 1730 was probably a mistake for Fincher. George Fisher was listed in Nottingham Township in 1729. The Thomas Fisher in Haverford is of interest because Obadiah Bonsall was also taxed there in the same year. Obadiah Bonsall was a brother-in-law of Martha (Fisher) Bonsall, daughter of John and Sarah Fisher of Kingsess on the lower Schuylkill River. Martha's brothers were John and James Fisher of Kingsess.

Several small children of Thomas and Elizabeth must have died about 1727. There is a long gap in the apparent ages of the children, based upon the marriage dates. One would expect the grandparents and parents to be honored with the first four children's births. A child named for Thomas Fisher's mother may have been one of those that died, as well as early children named Thomas and Mary, whose names were used again later. Unfortunately, the Kennett birth records for most of Thomas Fisher's children are missing.

In 1735 Thomas bought 15 acres on the northern boundary of his land from Ruth Harlan, which greatly increased his frontage on Savier/Parkersville Road.

The Fisher farm was in the Parkersville rural community in Pennsbury, a short distance north of the old Kennett Meeting House. A view of the eastern part of the 15-acre addition of 1735 can be found between the present intersections of Street Road with Graychalk Road and Parkersville/Savier Mill Road. Street Road runs through the land. The Crosslands senior home on Street Road lies in the lower part which was sold to William Webb in 1741. Deeds for the land were signed by both Thomas and Elizabeth by their marks, showing that neither were educated.

Thomas was on the Kennett tax lists beginning in 1715, and finally purchased the land and cleared the title via a patent from the Penn sons in 1739. He had to pay 38 years of arrears in the quitrents (L3:16:0d), and a purchase price of eighty pounds 13 shillings. Thomas farmed the land with his two oldest sons, William and James, until 1740. In 1740, the upper 118 ¼ acres were sold to the oldest son William. In 1741, the remaining 81 acres were sold to William Webb. All the Fishers except William moved northward to the northwest part of East Caln (now West Brandywine), a distance of less than 20 miles. The Quaker meeting records are silent concerning the Fishers from 1714 until 1728. From 1728 onward, the meeting records of Kennett and Caln (Bradford Monthly Meeting) are filled with references to Thomas and Elizabeth and their family.

In August of 1728, Thomas Fisher and his wife's cousin James Few were chastised by Kennett meeting, for threatening to bring suits in a civil court (it is not clear if they were suing each other or someone else). This may have concerned the boundaries of the Fisher and Few lands which adjoined at the northeast part of the Fisher claim, or it may have concerned the disposition of the old Huntley farm in Kennett, which the Few family had bought from Elizabeth Huntley Fisher's widowed mother. After months of persuasion by the Quakers, Thomas agreed to a statement to the congregation, which was accepted as giving satisfaction. James Few remained adamant and was placed in the care of his father, Isaac Few.

"1728/9 4th of 11th Mo. (Jan 7, 1729) At our Monthly Meeting of Newark held at Center. The ffrnd appointed to read the Testimony given into Last meeting by Tho: ffisher report he hath done it which here

under followeth. "To the Monthly Meeting of Newark held at Kennett ye 7th of ye 10th moth 1728. Inasmuch as I have been guilty of fetching a warent for one in Communion with me Contrary to the good order Established amongst us for which disorderly act I am sorrey and gives this as a testimony against the same as witness my hand. Thomas ffisher." (Note: Thomas Fisher in 1740 signed his deed with a mark (x). The clerk or copier here may have omitted any notation of "his mark.")

The Fishers stayed in Kennett until the marriage in 1740 of their eldest daughter Elizabeth Fisher to Joseph Wilkinson of East Caln. All the family except William, the eldest son, decided to follow Elizabeth to East Caln. They made preparations to take up land at the western end of East Caln, at a distance of less than 20 miles northwest from the Kennett homeplace.

IV. Thomas Fisher in Calne

Thomas Fisher and most of his family moved from Kennett Township to East Caln around 1740, as described in the references at the beginning of this book. In the course of searching for the origins of Thomas Fisher, the Caln neighborhood was studied further and the additional findings are described here. Only one possible clue to Thomas Fisher's ancestry was discovered. A William Fisher was administrator in 1731 for Jonathan Bradley who had land "in the forks of the Brandywine." One new finding was the exact location of the Fisher farms in Caln, previously unknown, described in the following.

Some of Elizabeth Huntley Fisher's relatives were already in Caln long before 1740. Her three sisters all married at Kennett but settled in East Caln. Deborah Huntley married James Bruce of East Caln in 1720, and was in East Caln by 1728. Mary Huntley married Peter Whitaker in 1725, a landowner in East Caln as early as 1724. Sarah Huntley married John Stanton of East Caln in 1727.

In 1740, Joseph Wilkinson of Caln Township came to Kennett to marry Elizabeth Jr., the eldest daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher. Several members of the Wilkinson family had come in 1730 from Ballynacree, northwest of Belfast in Ballymoney Parish. Joseph and Elizabeth went to Caln to live. Other Fisher family members and relatives soon followed.

In 1741, Thomas Fisher obtained title to 250 acres of land in East Caln, a little to the west of Joseph Wilkinson. In the same year their son James transferred his Quaker membership, with his wife Alice (Stanfield) Fisher. Alice was a daughter of Samuel Stanfield and Jane Andrew, who came in 1728 from Lurgan, northern Ireland and settled in Kennett on the William Andrew tract. Peter Whitaker and wife Mary (Huntley) Whitaker moved from Kennett and settled on land adjoining the south side of the Thomas Fisher land in Caln.

Thomas Fisher's tract in Caln was part of William Penn's proprietary township right which was defined in a 1708 warrant for 500 acres. The Penn tract was divided between William Henderson and Samuel Black in 1740, who ceded respectively to Thomas Fisher and Peter Whitaker.

In 1742 Thomas and Elizabeth, with their three younger children (Francis, Thomas Jr., and Mary), transferred their Quaker membership from Kennett (Newark Monthly Meeting) to Caln (Bradford Monthly Meeting). The oldest son, William, stayed on the farm in Kennett.

In 1743 James Fisher obtained his own tract of 200 acres of land a short distance to the south of the Thomas Fisher/Peter Whitaker tracts. At the same time Samuel Fisher, the teen-aged son of Thomas and Elizabeth Fisher, transferred his Quaker membership from Kennett.

The Thomas Fisher tract in Caln was near the northwest corner of old East Caln, Chester County, about 30 miles northwest of their old farm at Kennett. The new tract was about 3 miles northwest of the Caln Meeting House. It lies now at the west end of West Brandywine Township, the northwest corner of the tract being about a mile south of the present Wallace Township line, and about ¼ mile east of Brandywine Creek (West Branch). The tract was in the neighborhood of the present Brandamore and Cedar Knoll communities. Lafayette Road now lies on the northern boundary of the Fisher tract. The West Brandywine Township Building is across the road from the north part of the Fisher tract. The east boundary of the Fisher tract is now Highway 82 (Manor Road). This area is a short distance north of Coatesville. The tract of James Fisher, son of Thomas, was about ½ mile below his father. The center of his tract was near the present intersection of Monacy and Baker Streets.

The Fishers were members of Bradford Monthly Meeting, which met alternately at the Caln meeting house (near Coatesville) and Bradford meeting house (near Marshallton). Thomas Sr. became a leader at Caln and was named overseer of Caln Meeting. After he died, his widow Elizabeth became overseer. Later, Thomas Jr. was overseer.

In 1742 William Fisher obtained a warrant for 200 acres in West Caln, "next to Peter Whitaker," but no survey was ever executed. This was probably William, son of Thomas and Elizabeth (Huntley Fisher), but could have been one of Thomas Fisher's missing relatives. In 1731, a William Fisher was administrator of the estate of Jonathan Bradley, who had land "on the branches of Brandywine Creek." William, son of Thomas and Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher never left Kennett, and died in 1748.

Thomas Fisher's will was proved August 27, 1747, and is filed in Will Book B. Page 228, Chester County, Pennsylvania. Thomas gave his fourth son Thomas Jr. the upper 100 acres of the East Caln tract, and the remaining 150 acres to the third son, Samuel. Samuel sold his share to Thomas Jr. in 1770.

In 1748, the widower John Cope of Caln married the widow Elizabeth Fisher.

The sons Thomas Jr., Francis and Samuel all went briefly to New Garden Monthly Meeting to marry, but settled in East Caln. Francis moved back to New Garden in 1761 with his wife and three children. James and wife Alice, with five children, moved west of the Susquehanna in 1762, to Newberry township, just southwest of Harrisburg in York County, where they joined the Warrington Meeting. The youngest daughter, Mary, married at Uwchlan.

I surmised in my earlier book that Thomas Fisher or his descendants may have founded Fisherville in old East Caln. It is now clear that both Thomas and James Fisher lived several miles to the northwest of Fisherville. If any descendants had anything to do with Fisherville, it will be necessary to search much later in the land records to find any connection. Newspaper articles between 1880 and 1910 do not mention the origin of the name. One article describes "Beaver Valley Mills," formerly Durhing's Woolen Factory, and says Fisherville grew up around that, apparently on Beaver Creek. In 1910 the entire village was sold, consisting of 27 acres of ground, a large mill of 3 stories, and 17 tenement houses and buildings.

More details of the Fisher family life in Caln are given in "Ancestors and Descendants of Cephas Fisher Jr." and other sources listed in the catalog for the Family History Library at Salt Lake.

Other researchers have traced many descendants of Thomas Fisher of Kennett. Check the LDS web site at Familysearch.com.

Neighboring Landowners in Caln

1708 Penn Survey

William Penn's 500-acre survey in Caln in 1708, part of which later became Thomas Fisher's farm, mentioned 3 abutting landowners.

<u>James Spencer</u> – Nothing is known of him. A John Spencer was in the Londongrove Township tax list for 1724.

George Claypool -- James Claypoole, merchant and Helena his wife came in 1683 with seven children and five servants, aboard an unnamed ship which carried passengers from the Netherlands. He became a Commissioner of Property in 1684. Joseph Buckley and James Claypoole obtained a warrant for land in 1713, with 1820 acres on the north line of Caln going to Claypoole. The Claypoole land soon went to George Claypoole, a probable son of James. South of this William Branson, of Philadelphia, held 1275 acres. In 1739 the bounds of the Caln Township survey described the Claypoole tract as abutting the northeast corner of the township and lying on the line of Springton Manor, with William Branson's land lying below Claypoole. In 1737 James Eldridge requested a grant of land "within the Proprietors Manor of Springton adjoining to his Land and the Land of George Claypoole."

William Branson – He came from Berkshire in 1708 and became a prominent merchant of Philadelphia. He had iron mills around French Creek in Nantmeal Township, Chester County. Of Philadelphia, in 1708 he patented 1225 acres in Caln Township below George Claypool's land. He may have lived in Caln in 1731, and was "of Reading" in 1741. The the Branson tract in Caln abutted the east side of the Penn proprietary tract that was later divided for Henderson and Black and sold to Thomas Fisher and Peter Whitaker. Parts of the Branson tract were sold to Francis Ferris, Robert Irwin, Samuel McKinley, Susannah Pyle and Joseph Wilkinson, all neighbors to the east of the Fisher/Whitaker land. William Branson lived to be 104 years old.

1740 Penn Survey

In April of 1740 the sons of William Penn re-surveyed their father's 1708 tract of 500 acres in Caln. The new survey mentions 3 names in addition to those in the 1708 bounds. The 1740 survey notes that the property was divided for William Henderson and Samuel Black, then sold to Thomas Fisher and Peter Whitaker.

William Henderson – He married about 1694, Katherine (--) of Kennett. A 1737 land record refers to a 1676 grant to John Henderson and others at Chichester. In 1733 John Henderson of New London Township bought land at Chichester from Samuel Gelston, "a minister of the gospel." A resurvey of the upper half of a 500-acre tract belonging to the sons of William Penn in Caln was dated 10 April 1741 for William Henderson, who sold it to Thomas Fisher who patented it 20 May of the same year.

Ann Welch – She obtained a warrant in 1714 for 220 acres in Caln, surveyed in 1718. The 1721 tax list for Caln says Ann Welch was a nonresident landowner. In 1733 Anne Welche was of Newtown Township. Henry and Walter Welch were in the Kennett taxables in 1753. In 1810 Ann and Sarah Welsh were Baptists in East Fallowfield Township.

<u>Joseph Darlington</u> – See below, 1741 Fisher survey.

Edward Irwin – George Irwin, son of Jared was born in Ireland in 1685. In 1721 he married Jane Matlack of Burlington, New Jersey. He died in 1748 in Brandywine Manor, West Nantmeal. Robert Irwin, one of 12 children, bought 200 acres from William Branson's tract at the southeast corner of what became the Fisher/Whitaker lands. In 1728 Edward Erwin, a probable son of Robert, signed a petition for the division of Caln Township.

1741 Fisher Survey

The survey of the upper half of the Penn tract in Caln for Thomas Fisher, in May of 1741, named 7 landowners in the bounds:

<u>John Wall</u> – He was born about 1710 and married Phebe Buffington in 1740. Another of that name appeared in the 1715 taxables in Goshen. He appeared in the 1753 taxables in East Caln. A John Wall was Pastor of St. Agnes Catholic Church in West Chester in 1853.

Joseph Darlington – . A biography for the Darlingtons of Caln Township appears in Futhey/Cope: "William Darlington, a settler in West Nantmeal about 1730, came perhaps from Ireland, judging from his associations. He died in the fall of 1757, leaving a wife, Mary, and children Joseph, Robert, John, and Meredith. Joseph Darlington was a single man in Aston in 1715, and in 1718-19, of Goshen, but in 1721 was a married man in Caln township, where he probably resided until his death." Another biography in the Futhey/Cope History of Chester County says "Job Darlington of Darnhall, Cheshire, England, with Mary, his wife, had children Abraham, John, Joseph, Matthew, Jane, Mary, and perhaps others. The mother died Dec. 18, 1728, and the records of the parish of Whitegate show that Job was buried Aug. 11, 1731. Of the children, Abraham and John came to Pennsylvania, and tradition says it was through the inducement of John Neild, an uncle by marriage, who lived in Aston Township." The two families may have been related or the same, since Abraham Darlington from Cheshire and a Joseph Darlington were both in Aston Township in 1715. A Joseph Darlington was in Caln by 1728. The survey of Samuel Fisher's sale of 150A in 1770 says Joseph Darlington was deceased.

George Claypoole

See previous, 1708 Penn survey.

<u>Samuel Black</u> – He married Elizabeth (--) about 1719 in Upper Providence. Reverand Samuel Black was the first pastor of Brandywine Manor Presbyterian Church, 10 November 1736 to May of 1741. The land patent for the church property went to Matthew Robinson and John Smith in 1786, then was conveyed to a group including Samuel McKinley, another former neighbor of the Fishers in Caln. In 1813 he was in General Stewart's Company, 97th Regiment which was sent to Elkton, Maryland due to "wars & rumors of wars" in Europe.

<u>James Spencer & Theofilus Erwin (Irwin)</u> – Nothing is known of James Spencer. A John Spencer was in the Londongrove Township tax list for 1724. Theofilus Erwin, at the northeast end of the Fisher land, was probably related to Edward Erwin who had land at the southeast corner of the Samuel Black/Peter Whitaker tract below the Fishers.

<u>Samuel McKinley</u> -- Samuel McKinley and John Wall, neighbors of Thomas Fisher, performed the inventory of Thomas Fisher's estate in 1747.

<u>Peter Whitaker</u> -- Peter Whitaker of Kennett married Mary Huntley, daughter of William Huntley deceased, of Kennet, in February of 1725 at the Kennett meeting house. By 1732 he had land in East Caln. In 1734 Peter Whitaker and Mary his wife sold 170 acres of their tract in East Caln, to William Taylor and Mary his wife. The survey of Samuel Fisher's sale of 150 acres in 1770 says the land below his was that of Peter Whitaker, deceased.

The 1743 James Fisher Survey

A survey of 200 acres to James Fisher in 1743, below the Irwin tract and southeast of the Fisher/Whitaker lands, named 7 landowners in the bounds:

Ann Welche – See previous, 1741 Penn survey.

Edward Ervin (Irwin) - See above, 1741 Penn Survey.

Benjamin Mendenhall – John and Benjamin Mendenhall came from Wiltshire before 1685 and settled in Concord and Kennett Townships. John and Aaron Mendenhall, sons of the immigrant John Mendenhall, went to East Caln. Aaron, nephew of the immigrant Benjamin, signed a petition to divide Caln Township in 1728.

<u>Edward Thomson</u> – He was in the 1715 tax list for Edgmont Township. He signed a petition in 1728 to divide Caln Township.

<u>Andrew Cox</u> -- He was listed in the 1753 tax list for East Caln. In 1759 he contributed supplies from Bradford and East Caln Townships for Forbe's Expedition to Fort DuQuesne.

<u>William Littler</u> – In 1713 Phillip Taylor of Thornbury Township and Ann his wife, with Samuel Littler of Nottingham and Rachel his wife, the widow of Thomas Taylor, deceased, sold land in Middletown Township. William Littler was in the 1739 tax list for Newlin Township and the 1753 tax list for East Caln. Samuel Littler went to Tennessee and Ohio with James Fisher Jr. in a later generation.

<u>William Wilson</u>—On 26 May 1742 John Patten and William Wilson, both of Gray Abbey in the County of Downe, Ireland, made an oath that Anne Rowan, Sr., alias Patten, the late wife of Cornelius Rowan, formerly of Ireland and lately of New London in the County of Chester, deceased, died in Ireland in the year 1739. In 1743 John Wilson was of Fallowfield Township, Chester County.

The 1742 William Littler Survey

The William Littler Survey mentioned James Fisher on the east side. Other names mentioned in the bounds:

Gawen Moore – He was a Lieutenant, 1747-8 in volunteer "Associators" formed due to the French-English war in Europe. He was in the East Caln taxables of 1753.

Francis Zooc – One of the Amish Zug/ Zook family. In 1719 Ulrich & Peter Zug (Zook) came from Switzerland and settled first in Germantown. Other family tracts were in West Whiteland and in Lancaster County. Francis Zook, a member of this family, was in the East Caln tax list for 1774.

Andrew Cox – See above, 1743 James Fisher survey.

The 1770 Survey, Thomas Fisher Jr. to Samuel Fisher

The lower 150 acres from the Thomas Fisher tract was left to Samuel Fisher per Thomas Fisher's will in 1747. Samuel Fisher sold this to his brother, Thomas Fisher Jr. in 1770. The new survey mentioned Joseph Darlington deceased and Peter Whitaker deceased in the bounds.

Thomas Fisher's will was proved August 27, 1747, and is filed in Will Book B. Page 228, Chester County, Pennsylvania. The will and accounting is shown in the appendix to this volume. Thomas gave his third son, Samuel (the oldest unmarried son), 150 acres of land, 100 acres to the fourth son, Thomas Jr., and smaller bequests to the other children William, James, Elizabeth, Francis and Mary. In 1748, the widower John Cope married Elizabeth, widow of Thomas Fisher. Thomas Jr., Francis and Samuel all went briefly to New Garden Monthly Meeting to marry, but settled in East Caln. Francis moved back to New Garden in 1761 with his wife and three children. James and wife Alice, with five children, moved west of the Susquehanna in 1762, to Newberry township, just southwest of Harrisburg in York County, where they joined the Warrington Meeting. The youngest daughter, Mary, married at Uwchlan.

Chapter V. Other Fishers of Chester County

George Fisher, Immigrant on the Bristol Merchant

Records of the Court of Newcastle County (now part of Delaware) show that a George Fisher bought a town lot (a kitchen and half a lot) in 1687/88, from the Swede Justus (Eustace) Anderson. Justus Anderson lived at Upland (now Chester Township) in Chester County, and the Fisher lot is assumed to have been from the Anderson lands there which he purchased from the Swedish priest Lasse Corolus, but it could have been in Newcastle County. There was some sort of dispute over payment, but after John Smith and Hugh McGregory testified, George Fisher settled by paying 19 pounds. Hugh McGregory died in Cecil County, Maryland in 1703. It is not clear which of several John Smiths was involved. No further record of this George Fisher has been found in Chester County or Newcastle County. I think he may have been George, son of Dennis and Susannah Fisher, who came by 1683 to Salem County, West New Jersey from Portsmouth, Hampshire. George, son of Dennis and Susannah Fisher, was christened September 1, 1667, in the parish church of St. Thomas in Portsmouth.

A connection between George Fisher of Upland (Chester), and Thomas Fisher of Kennet Township is possible. Thomas Fisher and Thomas Robinson received a joint grant from William Penn for land near Brandywine Creek, in the Province of Pennsylvania, in March of 1701. The Robinson/Fisher tract, about 15 miles from Upland, was in what is now Pennsbury Township, formerly part of Kennet Township, Chester County. One of the abutting neighbors of Thomas Fisher was Zerobabel Thatcher, a son or nephew of Jonathan Thatcher, a fellow passenger of George Fisher on the "Bristol Merchant." John Robinson of Thomastown in Monkstown Parish, southeast Dublin County in Ireland may be the same as John Robinson who also came with George Fisher.

An Irish George Fisher arrived in Pennsylvania in 1685 aboard the "Bristol Merchant," carrying mostly Irish passengers but with some immigrants from around Bristol, England. George came as a servant to the Jaspar Farmer family. The Farmers came from Garrankinnesfeake, County Cork, Ireland, on the northeast side of the bay of the city of Cork, but Jaspar Farmer is mentioned in the Quaker records of Youghal Monthly meeting, at the eastern edge of County Cork, as early as 1669. This George Fisher, being bound to Jaspar Farmer, would have lived first in Philadelphia County on the estate of the Farmer Family, in Dublin Township. His indenture should have ended by 1689. Jaspar Farmer died only two months after the immigration, and it is not known if George Fisher was released from the bond. He may have gone to Joseph Fisher of Dublin Township, who came from Dublin County, Ireland in 1683 and who seems to have been his father or close relative. In January of 1696, George Fisher and Edward Farmer were witnesses to the Philadelphia will of Thomas Tearewood. Joseph Fisher, executor, was born at Elton, Cheshire, but was of Stillorgan (Dublin County), Ireland, when he brought Thomas Tearewood as a servant aboard the "Lion" in 1683. George Fisher was plaintiff in a suit in the Bucks County Quarter Sessions, against Edward Shaw for debt, in 1699.

John Fisher of Chichester, Chester County

John Fisher, a hatter of Chichester Township, is one of the few known Fishers who lived in Chester County before 1713. His death coincides almost exactly with Thomas Fisher's application for land in Kennett. He died intestate, and his administration was assigned to his wife Barbara on 10 March, 1701. He probably belonged to the Church of England, but lived only 4 or 5 miles from the Concord meeting house where Thomas Fisher and Elizabeth Huntley were married. The administration papers are lost. On 25 March, 1702, Barbara was appointed administrator for Isaac Jessop of Chichester, taylor, as his principal creditor.

Thomas and John Fisher of Chester County could have been the brothers Thomas (born 1682) and John (born 1679), sons of Thomas and Rosamond Fisher of Dunleary in Dublin County, Ireland. Considering his age, John would then have been married less than a year when he died.

Another possibility is that John Fisher of Chichester was the one who married "Barbary" Munckhouse on 8 February 1699, at Embleton near Cockermouth and Pardshaw in Cumberland. Barbara Munckhouse, daughter of William, was christened 7 February 1676, at Caldbeck in Cumberland, about 10 miles northeast of Pardshaw. (In 1700, a John Fisher, Quaker, came to Bucks County, Pennsylvania from Pardshaw.)

William Fisher, Agent for Elizabeth Andross of Thornbury, Chester County

Elizabeth Andross (Andries, Andrews) was the widow of George Andross, of the City of Chester in Chester Township. George died about 1687. Probable sons were Mather and Claus Andross. The widow and sons moved to Thornbury Township in 1695, where she became a neighbor of Richard Woodward. His property adjoined her tract.

In 1701, Richard Woodward married Deborah Standfield, daughter of Francis, deceased. Richard and Deborah settled on his tract next to the Andross family.

Deborah (Standfield) Woodward was an aunt of Elizabeth Huntley, who married Thomas Fisher in 1713. When Elizabeth Andross bought the Thornbury land, her agent was William Fisher, identity unknown.

William Fisher, Executor of Jonathan Bradley, 1731

In 1730, William Fisher was administrator for the estate of Jonathan Bradley, which included a tract of 200 acres on the branches of the Brandywine that had been surveyed in 1729. In 1730 Edward Bradley, a glazier of Philadelphia, had land in East Caln. The identity of this William Fisher is unknown.

Joseph Fisher of East Bradford/Caln/Uwchlan

This Fisher came a little later than the scope of my search for Thomas Fisher but may be relevant. This information came from a researcher and I have not worked the source records. This Joseph Fisher has not been placed with respect to earlier Fishers of Chester County. In 1774 Joseph Fisher married Susannah Gray of East Bradford, at the Old Swedes Church at Wilmington. An old map of part of Uwchlan and West Pikeland shows a Joseph Fisher house about 2 miles south of the Uwchlan Quaker meeting house which was at Lionville. One Joseph Fisher leased land from Ezra Taylor whose estate sold it in 1805 to John Fisher. A Joseph Fisher was taxed in East Caln Township in 1776 and 1783 as an inmate (tenant), not a land owner. A Joseph Fisher was taxed in 1786 in Uwchlan.

Henry Fisher

Henry Fisher was administrator for Moses Rambo of Darby, Chester County, in 1757. His identity is unknown.

Philip and Peter Fisher et al

Benjamin Cummings described these Fishers in "A Fisher Family of Chester County, Pa." in 1898. "--- Fisher, whose first home is not given, b. ab. 1700? Is said to have settled in Germantown, Philadelphia county. He had a son named Peter, b. ab. 1740? Who settled in York county Pa., and had the following children: Jacob b. ab. 1768, William b. ab. 1770, Peter b. ab. 1772, John b. ab. 1774, Adam b. ab. 1776, Frederick b. 22 Dec 1778, Elizabeth b. ab. 1780. Peter Fisher, father of these children, died and his widow married Rev. Phillip Young, a Lutheran minister, and removed to Martinsburg Va. Mr. Ra. A. Brock, of Richmond Va. Has a full record of Frederick's descendants. Penna Magazine vol 15 Page 269." Peter Fisher of Lebanon township, Lebanon county, Pa, died shortly before 1800. Leaving the following adult children who are all supposed to have been living in that year: Peter, Catherine wife of John Zimmerman, Jacob, Phillip, Margeret wife of Jacob Wise, David, Christian, John. Duplication of given names would indicate this family to be related to Peter Fisher of York county, above named. These names are given in Egles's History of Lebanon county Pa., page 336."

Philip Fisher left a will in Germantown, Philadelphia County in 1795. Peter Fisher had 50 acres surveyed in West Nantmeal Township in 1784/5. Herman and Jacob Fisher appear in the land patent books for Chester County in 1738. Custin and Poston Fisher (perhaps the same person) appear in the Chester County tax books in 1725. These Fishers were probably German immigrants.

VI. Neighboring Land Owners of Eastern Kennett

Budd

The Budd family came from Somerset in England, not far south of Bristol. Thomas Budd came by early 1682, and settled first on the east side of the Delaware River, in or near Burlington. The family were already in residence when William Penn arrived in 1682.

John Budd, brewer of Philadelphia was one of the earliest absentee landowners in and near Kennet, Chester County. He was never a resident in Kennet. However, there are several points of interest regarding the Budd family and their possible connections to Thomas Fisher of Kennet.

Thomas Fisher's wife, Elizabeth Huntley Fisher, was a granddaughter of Francis Standfield of Marple, Chester County. Prior to 1699, the heirs of Francis Standfield began taking up land in Kennett and across the Brandywine in Birmingham township. By 1703, a large part of the east end of Kennet was claimed by James Standfield, William Huntley, Thomas and John Hope, and Isaac Few, all heirs of Francis Standfield.

In 1703 John Budd of Philadelphia invested in 500 acres having a corner boundary in common with William Huntley's land. He also took up large holdings near the northeast end of Kennet, then called Bensalem, and a tract at the east end of Marlborough nearby. Other large holdings were in Nottingham Township on the Elk River.

The Standfield family and the Budd family were among those Quakers who joined the movement of George Keith, which separated for a number of years from the other Quakers. Many of them became Baptists, while others returned to the Church of England or to the Quakers. The Budd family joined the Baptists, and in 1697 Thomas Budd was baptized at the Birmingham Baptist Church or one of its predecessor locations. James Standfield, in his will of 1699, named John Budd Jr. as a trusted friend. The same will names James Poultiss (Poulter) as a renter of a Standfield house. James Poultess and James Standfield were both members of the Keithian separation.

James Standfield married Mary Hutchinson of Burlington Monthly Meeting. Thomas Robinson, joint applicant with Thomas Fisher in 1701 for land in Kennet, may have been the one who is said to have been married to Susannah Budd of Burlington before 1682.

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Chambers

Benjamin Chambers had land holdings north of Thomas Fisher, above the Harland tracts. He was never resident in Kennett. He came on the "Welcome" in 1682, was sheriff of Philadelphia in 1683, and was active in public affairs. He became president of the Free Society of Traders, and in 1688 he married Hannah Smith of Philadelphia. In the same year he received a warrant to survey 7100 acres in Chester County, which he later sold to Nathaniel Newlin and which became Newlin Township. He was granted a franchise for the ferry on the lower Schuylkill River near the Delaware, and lived there near John and Sarah Fisher at Kingsessing. Martha Fisher, daughter of John and Sarah, married Benjamin Bonsall and settled on part of the Kingsessing land with her husband. Benjamin Chambers also took up a large quantity of land on Pocopsin Creek in the northeast part of Kennet Township, and sold it to settlers. He sold part to Obadiah Bonsall. The land in this deed was in Bensalem, which became part of Bradford, now Pocopsin Township, and was about a mile north and northeast of Thomas Fisher's 1701 land.

Dicks/Dix

Peter Dix (Dicks) came from Chester, England in 1684. He lived in Birmingham Township on the east bank of the Brandywine. In 1701 he obtained a warrant for 554 acres on the west bank, forming a large

wedge that abutted part of the north side of the land which would become the Huntley tract in 1703. Peter Dix died in 1704, and his widow married John Mendenhall in 1708.

Futhey & Cope, History of Chester County

Peter Dicks (Dix), of the city of Chester, England, flaxdresser, purchased 250 acres of land in Pennsylvania, Aug. 16, 1684, from James Dicks, who had bought the same from William Penn in 1681. Peter, with his wife Esther, arrived about 1686 and settled in Birmingham, where he died in 1704. In 1708 his widow married John Mendenhall.

The children of Peter were Hannah, m. to Jonathan Thatcher; Elizabeth, m. to Richard Tranter, 10,2,1714; Sarah, m. to Joseph Pyle, 4, 16, 1715; Esther, m. to Francis Swayne, 1724; Deborah, m. to Jonathan Fincher, 1726; Nathan, and Peter, who married in 1716 Sarah, widow of Thomas Powell, Jr., and daughter of Joseph Hayes, of Cheshire, England. He settled in Providence, and later in life became interested in iron works. He died about 1760, leaving a widow, Sarah, formerly wife of William Swaffer, to whom he was married in 1750. His children were Joseph, b. 3, 26, 1717; James, b. 6,18, 1718; Nathan, b. 11, 2, 1719; Sarah, b. 1, 19, 1720; Peter, b. 10, 23, 1722; Job; John; Abraham; Esther, m. to John Darlington; Jane, b. Nov. 4, 1751; m. to John Peirce, 11, 17, 1786; Roger, b. 7, 30, 1753, m. Rebecca Maris, 5, 25, 1797, d. 12, 29, 1808. He was an esteemed minister among Friends.

Evans

In 1701 John Evans, from Pembrokeshire in Wales, received a warrant for land in Merion Township (Welsh Tract). In 1703 he and his son obtained another warrant for land in Radnor Township (Welsh Tract). In 1713 a survey of 100 acres partly abutting the north side of the Robinson/Fisher tract in Kennett, was laid out for Edward Evans, son of John Evans. A warrant was granted in 1714. The tract was taken up and resurveyed in 1733 by Daniel Few (cousin of Elizabeth Huntley Fisher) and his wife Esther (Howell). He was a son of Isaac Few. The Howells were from Pembrokeshire, Wales. Daniel Few sold this tract to Abraham Parker and moved to Wilmington, Delaware. The Few family were early immigrants from Wiltshire. Isaac Few married Hannah Standfield, sister of Mary Standfield Huntley, mother of Elizabeth Huntley who married Thomas Fisher of Kennett.

Few

The Few family were relatives of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, wife of Thomas Fisher of Kennet, Chester County. Hannah (Standfield) Few, wife of Isaac Few, was an aunt of Elizabeth Huntley, whose mother was Mary Standfield. The Few genealogy is summarized by Thomas Potts in his book "Our Family Ancestors" (1895). Richard and Jane Few of Wiltshire obtained land in Bucks County and at Chester. Isaac Few settled at the southeast end of Kennet Township (now Pennsbury). He bought the Huntley farm from Mary Huntley, widow of William, in 1709. James Few, son of Isaac and a cousin of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, settled at the east end of the Huntley tract from 1723 to 1726, after which the farm was sold to William Harvey.

Fletcher

Richard Fletcher of Withington, southern Lancashire (now in Greater Manchester) probably came in 1684, about the same time as Thomas Fisher, servant to Henry Baker of Bucks County. Francis Fletcher, a suspected sister of Richard in Lancashire, married James Yates, servant to Henry Baker and a passenger on the "Vine" of Liverpool. In 1713 Richard became the father-in-law of Thomas Fisher of Chester County. Mary Standfield, a daughter of Francis Standfield of Marple in Chester County, married William Huntley in early 1692. In 1713 their daughter Elizabeth married Thomas Fisher in Concord Monthly Meeting, Chester County, and they settled in Kennett, Chester County. William Huntley died in 1708, and in the fall of 1713 his widow married Richard Fletcher, formerly of Bucks County and Lancashire. They settled on a farm adjoining the old Huntley farm in Kennett, which Mary had sold to her brother-in-law Isaac Few in 1709.

The Harland Family

George Harland, son of James, was baptized in 1650 in the Church of England, at Monkwearmouth, in Durham, northeast England. The Harlands went to northern Ireland, and joined the Quakers of Lurgan Monthly Meeting. George married Elizabeth Duck of Lurgan in 1678, in the Parish of Shankell. They came to Pennsylvania about 1687, and it was the sons Ezekiel and Aaron who became neighbors of Thomas Fisher. The Harland residence was south of the Robinson/Fisher tract, but the family owned considerable acreage on the north side. A tract adjoining on most of the northern end of the Robinson/Fisher tract, was patented to Ezekiel Harland in 1718/19 by right of a warrant of 1714. Ezekiel Harland married first Mary Bezer, and second Ruth Buffington.

In 1735 Ruth Harland, widow of Ezekiel, sold a 15-acre triangle from the northern acreage, to Thomas Fisher, adjoining the Fisher land. About 1721 she sold 50 acres from the same tract, abutting Thomas Fisher, to Joseph Taylor Jr., grandson of Abiah Taylor of Bradford Township. Joseph Taylor married Catharine Baxter, a widow. The Taylors came from Didcott, Berkshire.

Heald/Dunbabin

Samuel Heald received a warrant in 1715 for 180 acres adjoining the east side of the Robinson/Fisher tract and lying between John Hope's land and Thomas Fisher.

In 1667 Jane Dunbabin of Great Sankey, on the Mersey River in lower Lancashire, married William Heald of Moberley, Cheshire, at Hardshaw Monthly Meeting near Liverpool. Samuel Heald, son of William and Jane, was born in 1668 at Moberley. He married Mary Bancroft, born in 1673 at Eccleston, Cheshire. Samuel and Mary immigrated in 1702 to Pennsylvania. In 1714 they moved onto land in Kennett, at the same time that Thomas Fisher and his wife Elizabeth Huntley Fisher moved onto the 1701 Robinson/Fisher tract there. The Heald tract adjoined on the entire east boundary of the Robinson/Fisher tract.

Thomas Heald, a cousin of Samuel Heald and brother-in-law of John Dunbabin of Over Walton in Cheshire, bought land in the township of Aston, in the forks of Chester Creek, in 1710. He settled in East Caln by 1728. The 1715 will of Thomas Heald reveals that he was also a cousin to John Crosby, son of Richard Crosby, and was a cousin of Katherine (Crosby) Fairlamb. It mentions land on Ridley Creek next to Thomas Taylor. Richard Crosby and Thomas Taylor were both trading partners of James Wallis, the earliest owner of land abutting Robinson and Fisher's tract.

Sarah Heald, daughter of Samuel, married Aaron Harlan, son of George. He died and the widow Sarah Harlan is shown as owner of the tract in Gilbert Cope's map of early landowners.

Hope

Thomas Hope was an uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, wife of Thomas Fisher of Chester County. He married Elizabeth Standfield, daughter of Frances and Grace, and settled in Marple Township.

This biographical sketch is given in "Bi-Centennial of Old Kennett Meeting House, 1710 - 1910":

Thomas and John Hope, brothers, probably from Wiltshire, England, were passengers on the Unicorn, of Bristol, which arrived 16th of 10th Mo. 1685 (16 Dec 1685). Thomas Hope married early in 1697, Elizabeth Stanfield of Chester Monthly Meeting, and in 1703 requested a certificate from that meeting to Newark, which, however, was not produced at the latter until 1707. He died in Kennet in the spring of 1708, and having no children devised to his wife, Elizabeth, the plantation of 400 acres during life, and then to brother John Hope, who was to pay some legacies, including L5 to the use of Kennet Meeting. His widow married William Horn in the fall of 1709.

John Hope and Elizabeth Hobson were married in the fall of 1712, she having produced a certificate from Friends in Ireland dated 22d of 9th Mo. 1710.

The lands of John Hope were adjoining to the eastward of the Harlan tract on which the meeting-house had been built. The children of John and Elizabeth Hope were: --

Sarah, b. 6-22-1713; m. Stephen Hayes

Thomas, b. 9-7-1714; d. 1749; m. in 1737 Elizabeth Boone.

John, b. 12-18-1716/17

Elizabeth, b. 3-4-1719; m. George Harlan and David Logue.

Susanna, b. 7-25-1723; m. John Fred.

Amos, d. 1769; m. Anne – and left daughters Mary and Elizabeth.

Mary Boone, wife of Thomas Hope, was a near relative to Daniel Boone. They had children: -- Thomas, b. 2-19-1738; m. his cousin Sarah Harlan; Deborah, b. 1-23-1741; William, b. 9-28-1743; Elizabeth, b. 7-7-1745; Mary, b. 4-22-1749.-

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In 1690 Nicholas Pyle of Bethel sold to Thomas Hope a tract at the north end of Concord Township. In 1696 James Standfield, uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, sold a tract in Marple to Thomas Hope. In 1702 Thomas Hope obtained 100 acres from a Benjamin Mendenhall & Joseph Pennel warrant of January 1703 (originally land of Isaac Few), and an adjoining 300 acres from a William Brown old rent tract of 1703. The combined 400 acres abutted the east end of the Huntley tract and wrapped around the bottom of the Oldham tract. When Thomas Hope died in 1708, he had no issue and left the property to his brother John Hope. John Hope also had a warrant, obtained in 1702, for 200 acres abutting on part of the north side of the Huntley tract and the west side of the Dix tract, part of an earlier claim abandoned by the heirs of Francis Standfield.

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Huntley

Elizabeth, wife of Thomas Fisher of Chester County, was a daughter of William Huntley and Mary Standfield.

William Huntley, father of Elizabeth Huntley Fisher may have been from the Huntley family of Barbados. William Huntley and his wife Elizabeth (Cowe) Huntley lived in the parish of St. Philips, Barbados. A younger William Huntley came to Chester County, Pennsylvania prior to 1691, and lived as a young man in Birmingham Township, near the present Chadds Ford village on the Brandywine. William belonged to the Birmingham Friends Meeting, and went before the Concord Monthly Meeting in 1692 to propose marriage to Mary. Shortly after the marriage, Mary's father, Francis Standfield died and left William a 25-acre tract from the Standfield estate in Marple, at the intersection of the present Sproul Road and Lawrence Road. A log structure on the site was studied in the 1960's but was dated a little later than the Huntley time. William also had a tract in Falls Township, Bucks County which appears in the tax list for 1693.

Just across the Marple Road from the Huntley/Standfield land in Marple was the estate of Ebeneazor Longshaw (Longford, Langford), who had come from Barbados or Antigua, perhaps bringing William Huntley to Pennsylvania. The Standfields later bought out all the Longshaw estate. In 1696, the orphan of Thomas Longshaw was placed in the care of Henry Hollingsworth of Chester (surveyor of the 1701 Robinson/Fisher tract in Kennett) until the court could find someone to take him. The orphan was then assigned to William Huntley pending the arrival of an expected immigrant, a pewterer. Any relationship between the Huntleys and Longshaws is unknown.

Thomas Longshaw owned land in Wilmington, in the constabulary of Newcastle Town, on the north side of Christina Creek, as early as 1685. James Standfield, uncle of Elizabeth Huntley Fisher, also owned land at the same location, along with his friends and trading associates including John Collet, Thomas Pierson (surveyor), James Read, and the merchant brothers James and Hercules Coutts. Thomas Green, also had property at the same place. It is not known if Thomas Green was a relative of Nicholas Green, who would marry the widow of the Sussex County Thomas Fisher (son of the immigrants John and Margaret Fisher.

In 1700, William Huntley sold his 25 acres in Marple to Peter Worrall, and returned to Birmingham with his family. No land record for the Birmingham tract has been found. He sold it by mortgage in February of

1703, to Jonathan Hayes, a former neighbor in Marple. William obtained a warrant and survey in the following September for 200 acres in Kennett, in the part that became Pennsbury. The tract lay along the north side of the present Hillendale Road, a mile or two west southwest of the Chads Ford crossing of the Brandywine. The homesite was at the east end, where Twin Turning Lane now lies. The Huntleys did not move their membership across the Brandywine, from Concord Monthly Meeting to Newark (Kennett), until April of 1705.

There is a likely reason that the deeds cannot be traced for the Huntley/Hayes tract in Birmingham. Jonathan Hayes was murdered in 1715 by Hugh Pugh, a former servant from Marple, and another assailant. Many of the deeds of the time were not recorded until much later.

The Huntleys had five children, Elizabeth, Francis, Deborah, Mary and Sarah.

- 1. Elizabeth, m. first Thomas Fisher, 1713. She married 2nd, John Cope, 1748.
- 2. Francis, d. June 1723, no known marriage.
- 3. Deborah, m. James Bruce, 1720. She married 2nd, Thomas Thornbury (Thornbrough), 1744 at Swede's Church, Wilmington.
- 4. Mary, m. Peter Whitaker, 1724.
- 5. Sarah, m. John Stanton, 1727. (Married out of meeting, by a magistrate. John Stanton later became a Quaker.)

William Huntley died at Kennett in 1708, stipulating in his will that his minor children be sent to his wife's married sisters in Thornbury and Birmingham. The widow Mary returned briefly to Marple and then to Birmingham in 1709, where she and daughter Elizabeth were members of Concord meeting until Thomas Fisher married Elizabeth there in 1713. In 1709 Elizabeth's mother, the widow Mary Standfield Huntley, sold the Huntley tract to Isaac Few, husband of Mary's sister Hannah (Standfield) Few. Mary remarried in the fall of 1713, to Richard Fletcher, and lived on the farm adjoining the south side of the old Huntley tract in Kennett, until at least 1736, when she attended the wedding of son James.

For more information concerning the Huntleys, see "The William Huntley Family of Colonial Pennsylvania" by this author.

Oldham

When the Huntley tract was surveyed in 1703, the land on the south side was labeled "vacant," but a note was added to the survey copy, "now Robert Oldham." When Mary, widow of William Huntley sold the farm in 1709 to Isaac Few, the deed referred to the land on the south side as the land of Robert Oldham. Robert Oldham received a warrant for this tract in April of 1707. Thomas Oldham, probably his son, was married to Susannah Few, daughter of Isaac Few. The Few tract was on the south side of the Robert Oldham land. Susannah was a niece of Mary (Standfield) Huntley and cousin to Elizabeth Huntley Fisher. By 1723, when Isaac Few transferred part of the Huntley tract to his son James Few, the land on the south side belonged to Richard Fletcher, who married the widow Mary Huntley in 1713. When Richard and Mary Fletcher patented the tract in October of 1734, it was in right of Robert Oldham's warrant of 10 April 1707.

Pearce

George Pearce was a neighbor on the west side of William Webb, who bought 301 acres of the old Wallis tract which adjoined on the west of Robinson and Fisher's land in Kennett. The Pearce land was on the Marlborough side of the Kennett boundary. George Pearce came from Winscom, Somerset. He married Ann Gainer of Thornbury, Glocester in 1679, and left from Bristol, England in 1684 for Pennsylvania, with three young children. They settled first in Thornbury Township, then moved to their Marlborough tract 1732. (See Futhey & Cope, History of Chester County.)

Robinson

Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher received a joint grant in March of 1701 from William Penn, for 300 acres of land near Brandywine Creek in the Province of Pennsylvania. Several Robinson families had immigrated to Philadelphia and other settlements along the Delaware River by that time, and it is not known with certainty to which family Thomas Robinson (joint warrantee with Thomas Fisher) belonged.

The records suggest that this Thomas Robinson may have been related to one of the Robinsons who came from Ireland and settled around Brandywine Creek in Newcastle County and Chester County. Some of them were Quakers, and may have fled to Ireland from England due to persecution. Joseph, James and George Robinson lived in Birmingham, Concord and Kennett townships where Thomas Fisher and Elizabeth Huntley Fisher's relatives were active.

Thomas Robinson could have been related to one of the Robinsons of Westmoreland who came to Chester County, or one of the New Jersey Robinsons from the north of England, as well as the English/Irish Robinsons

Robinson is one of the most common surnames in the British Isles and colonies, and there are many Thomas Robinsons in the records. This chapter is a summary of some of the records that were studied in searching for Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania. The study revealed only one connection (besides the 1701 land record in Chester County) between between the Robinsons and Fishers, being found in southeast Dublin County, Ireland.

Some of the early Robinson immigrants to Pennsylvania can be traced to places in England and Ireland:

(From the North of England)

- Richard Robinson married Elinor Preston in 1678 at the Salem Friends meeting house in West New Jersey. A group of Quakers who came to New Jersey in 1677 embarked from Scarborough on the northeast coast of Yorkshire. He may be one of the brothers Richard and Robert Robinson who obtained land in 1685 in Newcastle County.
- Robert Robinson, originally of Newbie Stones (Newby), Westmoreland near Penrith in northwest England, bought land on Crum Creek in 1682 and Ridley Creek in 1683 in Chester County, while still in England. He or a son Robert bought land on Duck Creek in Kent County in 1684. Two brothers Robert and Richard bought land on the north side of Christina Creek in Newcastle County in 1685.
- John Robinson came from Gainsborough, Lincolnshire in northeast England. His grandfather was from the nearby village of Scrooby, Nottinghamshire but died in Leyden, Netherlands. He came first to Falls Township, Bucks County, Pennsylvania in 1683.
- 1683? Thomas Robinson came by 1689 and married Susannah Wilson in the Burlington, New Jersey Quaker meeting in 1690. He died in 1691 in New Jersey. He named "kin" John Robinson of Epworth, Lincolnshire, near Gainsborough, and is a suspected relative of the 1683 immigrant John.
- William Robinson came from Rainton, Thirsk Monthly Meeting, Yorkshire in the north of England. Note: A Francis Robinson was born near the same place, at Fairbee (sic Faceby) about 1613 but moved to the County of Armagh, Segoe Parish, North Ireland where he was host for the Lurgan Monthly Meeting. George Robinson was a member of the same meeting in Ireland before immigrating to Pennsylvania in 1687.
- 1718? James Robinson married in 1721, East Nottingham, Chester Co. He was a son of John Robinson of Cumberland, Parish of Dearham in northeast England. Dearham is near Pardshaw, origin of John

Fisher of Bucks Co. who came in 1700. Not the same as James Robinson of Brandywine Creek, possible son of George.

(From Ireland)

- 1682 Francis Robinson was of Segoe Parish, County Armagh in north Ireland. He may not have immigrated but hosted several Pennsylvania immigrants at his house in Lisburn, a meeting place for Lurgan Monthly Meeting. He was born at Fairbee (Faceby), Yorkshire in north England, and may have been related to William Robinson from the same area.
- John & Catharine Robinson arrived on the "Bristol Comfort" in 1685 among mostly Irish passengers; servants to Thomas Webb (father of Daniel Webb). George Fisher, servant to Jaspar Farmer of Ireland, was a fellow passenger. George Fisher seems to have been of the same family as Joseph Fisher who came from Ireland in 1683 but was originally from Elton, on the Cheshire side of the Mersey River across from Liverpool.
- George Robinson came in 1687 from Ballyhagen, Parish of Kilmore, County Armagh, North Ireland; settled in Newcastle County southeast of the Brandywine near Shallpot Creek near the present town of Claymont, Delaware.
- Thomas Robinson was involved in an altercation with the Irish ship's mate Samuel Harrison aboard the "Tryall" in port at Philadelphia, and served on a Chester County jury in the same year. Thomas Robinson of Carrickmaine, southeast Dublin County, Ireland married Elizabeth Fisher there in 1672 and appears to have left Ireland by 1688.
- 1689? Patrick Robinson came from County Armagh, northern Ireland. He was Deputy Master of Rolls for Pennsylvania, in 1690.
- Thomas Robinson, about age 14, was indentured to Nathaniel Newlin of Concord Township, immigrant in 1683 from Queens County, Ireland near Dublin. Possible brothers George and John Robinson were also indentured at about that time in Chester County.
- 1724 William Robinson came from Ballycane Monthly Meeting, County Wicklow, Ireland, a Quaker.
- 1738 Thomas Robinson, a young man unmarried, from the Quaker meeting at Dublin, Ireland. May have been the same as Thomas who settled in Newcastle County near Naaman's Creek, a boundary with Chester County. Lineage is not clear, but there seem to have been several generations named Thomas and Abraham, intermarried with the Penrose family of Naamans Creek. The revolutionary war officer Thomas Robinson was of this family.
- 1752 Elizabeth Robinson came from Ballycane Monthly Meeting, County Wicklow, Ireland. A Quaker.

(From London & Staffordshire)

- 1703 Richard Robinson came from Bull & Mouth Monthly Meeting in London. He had been a "prisoner of barbary" 4 years before coming to London. He was received by the Philadelphia Quakers. He went to Burlington, then returned and married Sarah Jeffries at Philadelphia in 1704.
- 1711 Edward Robinson came from Stafford Monthly Meeting, England. A Quaker.
- 1718 Ebeneazor Robinson came from London 6 Week Meeting. A Quaker.

More About Robert Robinson:

Robert Robinson of Newby Stones (Newby) in Westmorland near Penrith, obtained a warrant from William Penn in 1682 for 300 acres of land in Chester County on Crum Creek, Providence Township. In 1683 he obtained another 250 acres by deed from William Penn, on Ridley Creek in Middletown Township. It may be that he never immigrated, the subsequent land transactions for the family being for sons. In 1684, Robert Robinson obtained 200 acres on Duck Creek in Kent County for his son Edward. In 1685, Robert Robinson and his brother Richard obtained land on the north side of Christina Creek in Newcastle County. Robert Robinson's Chester County lots are both shown on Thomas Holmes' original land map of Pennsylvania. The Ridley Creek lot went to John Robinson, son of Robert, then to Sarah Fallowfield. The Fallowfields were from the village of Great Strickland, a village in Westmoreland (now Cumbria) in the same neighborhood as Newby.

It was probably Robert Robinson Jr. who settled on the 1682 Crum Creek lot in Providence Township, Chester County. In June of 1683 he was on a grand jury at the provincial court of Chester. In June of 1688, he served on a "Petty Jury" at Chester. Robert Robinson (Jr.) is almost certainly "one of the seven sons of Robert Robinson" mentioned in Edward Robinson's Newcastle County land record in 1718. Four of the sons are identified positively in the land records (John on Ridley Creek, Middletown in Chester County; Robert and Richard on Christina Creek in Newcastle County; and Edward at Duck Creek in Kent County).

Robert Robinson's Providence tract was almost across Crum Creek from the Francis Standfield property. James Standfield, son of Francis, had property at the same place as Robert and Richard Robinson, on the north side of Christina Creek in Newcastle County. Francis Standfield was the maternal grandfather of Elizabeth Huntley Fisher of Chester County.

The Robert Robinson family of Westmoreland and Chester County, the George Robinson family of northern Ireland and Newcastle County, and the Richard Robinson family of Yorkshire and West Jersey may be of the same family. George Robinson came from Balyhagen in northern Ireland in 1687 among Quakers originally from England. Robert Robinson, possibly the one from Westmoreland, witnessed a will in the same village in Ireland, in 1688. Richard Robinson of New Jersey may be the brother (Richard) mentioned by Robert Robinson in 1685. If these links are correct, then Thomas Robinson of Chester County can almost certainly be traced through one of these branches to Ireland or northern England.

The Shipping Merchant Thomas Robinson:

Thomas Robinson of Chester County may have been the seaman and merchant of that name who shipped between the colonies and the ports of Liverpool and Bristol, from 1704 to 1715. A Thomas Robinson sailed aboard the "Tryall" in 1664, bound from London to "New England," at that time meaning anywhere in the New World colonies. ("Tryall" was a common spelling of "Trial.") It was probably the same or a relative of the same name who was in Pennsylvania aboard the same ship in 1688, and who in 1707 shipped from Liverpool to Philadelphia aboard the "Thomas and Elizabeth," Mr. Joseph Clayton, Master. The port books of Liverpool and Bristol also show voyages to Virginia by the merchant Thomas Robinson, between 1704 and 1715.

Incident Aboard the "Tryall"

In September of 1688, Thomas Robinson was charged in the provincial court in Chester, Chester County, Pennsylvania concerning an altercation aboard the "Tryall." The record says "Thomas Robins (Robinson) and Thomas Woodmans (Woodmansee or Woodmanson) being convicted before John Bristow for drunkenness, breach of peace, breaking ye great cabin door and ye head of Samuel Harrison, mate on board of ye Ship Tryall was for ye same called to ye bar but upon their submission to ye Court was ordered to pay 5s/ with all court charges."

In 1700 Samuel and Sarah Harrison were executors for Isaac Goodwin of Gloucester County, New Jersey. Samuel Harrison, mariner of Gloucester Township (across the river from Philadelphia), died in February of

1704. Samuel Harrison may have been related to Thomas Harrison, who came with the Lancashire passengers on the "Vine" in 1684, being a servant of the Hatton family. A fellow Lancashire passenger on that ship was Thomas Fisher, servant of the Baker family. Thomas Harrison lived in Chichester and Middletown townships, on Chester Creek across from the Neald family.

Thomas Woodmansee was probably related to William Woodmansee, who was at Upland as early as 1681 and had land where Caleb Pusey's mill was located on Chester Creek, near Aston Road at Chester.

Thomas Robinson of Chester County:

It is not known with certainty how all the Robinsons of the Delaware were related or how many generations of men named Thomas Robinson are represented in the records. The following records are of particular interest.

In June of 1688 Thomas Robinson was one of twelve who served on a petty jury at Chester. In the same year he was arrested for kicking in the cabin door aboard the "Tryall." In June of 1691 Thomas Roberson (Robinson) witnessed a sale of land on Ridley Creek, by Joshua Hastings of Nether Providence, to John Sharples. Joshua Hastings was among 12 buyers of a small lot in Chester in 1688, and among those buyers were Richard Few and Mordacai Maddock. The Few family became connected to Thomas Fisher's in-laws in Chester County. Mordacai Maddox (or a son of that name) later married into the John Fisher family of Bucks County.

In June of 1700 Thomas Robinson sued John Neald at a court of quarter sessions at Chester. John Neild had come on the "Endeavor" in 1683 as a servant to Thomas Janney (Janeway) of Cheshire, and was a fellow passenger with the Standfield family who would become in-laws to Thomas Fisher of Kennet. The Neild tract in Aston Township was a short distance from the Robert Robinson tract on Ridley Creek, which suggests that Thomas Robinson may have been living on that tract.

In March of 1701, Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher received a joint warrant from William Penn, for 300 acres near Brandywine Creek. The tract was surveyed by Henry Hollingsworth in December of 1701, but that survey is lost. The tract was re-surveyed in 1739 when Thomas Fisher applied for a patent. The acreage, in the part of Kennett Township that is now Pennsbury, was found in the re-survey to be 200 acres. The patent was granted to Thomas Fisher only, but did mention that the original warrant was for Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher.

Thomas Fisher paid 38 years arrears in quit-rent to the Penns in order to get the 1739 patent. The quit-rent terms were one shilling per 100 acres per year, which was originally the rate for purchased land. The original rate for servant and master headright land was more. By this time, however, the 1 shilling rate was being applied to most grants.

Thomas Robinson was listed in the Kennett tax rate for 1715. His tax (L0 S2 d09) was almost double that of Thomas Fisher in the same list (L0 S1 d10). This might imply that Thomas Robinson was the principal owner of improvements on the property at that time. No further record of him has been found in Kennet. It may be that he quit the property in favor of Thomas Fisher. It may have been the same Thomas Robinson, or others of that name, who appear in other Chester County tax lists: Marple, 1718; New Garden (Adjacent lands) poor, tax waived, 1719; Marple, 1720 poor, tax waived; Marple, 1721.

In 1727, a Thomas Robinson died intestate at Ridley in Chester County. Catharine Robinson was named administrator of his estate. She may have been his wife but also may have been Catharine (Howell) Robinson, wife of James Robinson, which would make her a probable sister-in-law of this Thomas Robinson. This may have been Thomas Robinson, formerly of Kennett.

Three Servant Boys:

George Robinson Sr. of Mill Creek in Newcastle County, immigrant from northern Ireland, may have been the father of three boys who were put into service in 1695 and 1696, as recorded in the County Court at Chester. George Robinson Sr. died before 1691, and his widow Ann married Benjamin Gill, who died in 1695, possibly the reason for these boys being put into service. The one named Thomas Robinson was too young to be Thomas Robinson of Kennet.

- (1) In December of 1695, Nathaniel Newlin brought in a servant boy named Thomas Robinson. The court bound him to a term of eight years from the previous May 20, presumably to Nathaniel Newland but the record does not say. Nathaniel Newlin was the son of Nicholas Newlin, who came from Montmellick Parish, Queens County, Ireland in 1683. The Newlins settled in Concord Township. Nathaniel Newlin was in the Concord tax list in 1715. He married (1) Mary Mendenhall from Wiltshire, and (2) Mary Fincher (of the Worcester Finchers) in 1729. He died in 1729 at Concord. (Thomas Fisher was married at Concord Monthly Meeting in 1713, to Elizabeth Huntley.) This Thomas Robinson would have been still in service in 1701 but could have obtained a land warrant if he was of age by then.
- (2) At the same court, Maurice Trent brought in a servant boy named John Robinson for bonding. The court assigned him to Thomas Cartwright, to serve seven and a half years from the court date. This may have been the same or a relative of John Robinson who was under bond to Thomas Rowland by 1705. Maurice Trent had land in Chichester on the Delaware River as early as 1696, near James Brown, William Flower and Jonas Sandelands. He was probably related to the Philadelphia merchant William Trent. By 1728 he or a son by that name had land in Willistown, Chester County, but was then of "Trent Town" in west New Jersey at the falls of the Delaware. Thomas Cartwright lived in the township of Aston, Chester County as early as 1696. He had land on Chester Creek. In 1708 William Lewis and Jane, widow of Thomas Cartwright late of Aston, deeded the Chester Creek property to George Robinson.
- (3) In June of 1696, John Bennett brought a servant boy named George Robinson for bonding. Six months later John Bennett returned George Robinson to court and bound him to Richard Thatcher of Birmingham for five years from the time of the court. John Bennett was a brother of Edward Bennett of Thornbury Township, an uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher. Richard Thatcher was from Uffington in Berkshire. John Bennett was son-in-law to William Brinton of Birmingham. John Bennett was in Birmingham taxables in 1715. John & Edward Bennett came from Overly, Worcestershire in 1684. George Robinson was in the Concord tax list in 1715. In 1699 Richard Thatcher sued William Huntley in the Quarter Session court in Bucks County. William Huntley became father-in-law to Thomas Fisher of Chester County in 1713. Zerobabel Thatcher, probable son of Richard Thatcher, settled next to Thomas Fisher in Kennett about 1729.

George, James and Joseph Robinson of Chester County:

The brothers George, James and Joseph Robinson lived in the townships of Birmingham, Concord, and Kennet in close proximity to Thomas Fisher and his in-laws. Little is known of another brother, William Robinson. They may have been sons of John Robinson of Monkstown Parish, Dublin County, Ireland. James Robinson, son of John, was born in 1684 at Thomastown, Monkstown Parish.

Joseph Robinson lived at the lower end of Birmingham in a small area which was once part of the manor of Rocklands in Newcastle County. His land and mill was on a bend of the Brandywine across from the George Harland tract. Joseph married in 1713, Elizabeth Harland, daughter of George Harland. William Huntley, father-in-law of Thomas Fisher, lived in Birmingham as early as 1691. When Francis Huntley, son of William died in 1723, Joseph Robinson was named as an account owed. Children of Joseph and Elizabeth Robinson were George (1715), Ann (1717), Rebecca (1719), Rachel (1721), Mary (1723), and Martha (1725).

James Robinson married, prior to 1695 Catharine Howell, youngest daughter of Thomas and Catharine Howell. In 1695 the will of Catharine Howell of Philadelphia, widow of Thomas Howell of New Jersey, mentioned her daughter's husband James Robinson. James Robinson had land near Mill Creek in Newcastle County in 1702. In 1713 he was named as a brother of George and Joseph Robinson near Brandywine. He or another of that name paid taxes in Kennett in 1732 and 1733.

George Robinson of Concord Township, Chester County left a will in 1717 naming wife Sarah and land in Aston. He was brother to James Robinson who married Catharine Howell, and to Joseph and William Robinson.

The Robinsons of Newcastle County:

George Robinson was born about 1666, and in 1687 came to Pennsylvania from Ballyhagen in Kilmore Parish in County Armagh, northern Ireland. He settled near Shallpot Creek between the Brandywine and Naaman's Creek near the present town of Claymont, Delaware in upper Newcastle County, where the Newark Quaker meeting was first established. He married 11-2-1688 Catharine Hollingsworth, daughter of Valentine. Valentine Hollingsworth was born in 1632 in England but came to Pennsylvania from Belleniskcrannell, Parish of Segoe in County Armagh, northern Ireland. Valentine Hollingsworth married Ann Ree (or Rae) of Tanderagee, County Armagh, who was born about 1628 and died 2 mo 1 1671. The Hollingsworths came to Pennsylvania in 1682.

Another George Robinson lived at Mill Creek, northwest of the Brandywine in Newcastle County, and is believed to have died before 1691. Some researchers believe he was the father of George of Shallpot Creek, and have speculated that some of the Robinsons of the area were his children.

Henry Hollingsworth came on the "Lion" of Liverpool in 1683, a fellow passenger being Joseph Fisher who brought a servant William "Robertson." Henry Hollingsworth, who surveyed the Robinson/Fisher tract in Kennett in 1701, was a son of Valentine Hollingsworth.

The Robinsons of New Jersey:

Richard Robinson was one of the earliest settlers in West Jersey, being among John Fenwicke's colonists. John Fenwick of Northumberland arrived aboard the "Griffin" in 1675 and established a colony of Quakers near the present town of Salem at the southern end of New Jersey. The "Kent" and the "Willing Mind" arrived with more settlers in 1677.

Richard Robinson was probably one of a group of Quakers who embarked from Scarborough on the east coast of Yorkshire, arriving on the east bank of the Delaware in 1677 aboard either the "Kent" or the "Willing Mind." Richard Robinson married Elinor Preston at the Salem Quaker meeting in 1678. He was probably the Richard Robinson who was sometimes of Philadelphia but returned to Burlington Monthly Meeting in 1703. He may have been the same as Richard, "brother of Robert Robinson" from Westmoreland.

In May of 1690 Thomas Robinson & Susannah Wilson were married at the Burlington Quaker meeting "even though he had no certificate from England." This Thomas Robinson died in the next year.

Elinor Robinson was a charter member of Duck Creek monthly meeting, not far from Salem but on the west side of the Delaware in Kent County, now part of Delaware. She or a relative may have been the cousin Eleanor of John Chads who was a relative of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher, wife of Thomas Fisher.

The Robinsons of Maryland:

There were numerous Robinson families in Maryland, beginning as early as 1650. Some of them lived near various Fisher families there. The Robinsons of Cecil County, in northeast Maryland, were only a few miles from southeast Chester County, Pennsylvania. A Thomas Robinson there was a merchant and

shipper. He was studied carefully but does not appear to be the same as Thomas Robinson of Chester County.

In 1697 Captain Thomas Robinson, merchant, ship commander and shipper of Cecil County in Maryland, former assembly man for Talbot County, married Sarah Frisby of Cecil County, daughter of the merchant James Frisby, formerly of London. Thomas and Sarah went to London for a number of years to conduct the company business, taking with them the younger Frisby children to be educated. Part of Sarah's dowry was land in Cecil County which was assigned to Thomas Robinson by Peregrine Brown, merchant of London. The London Frisbys and Browns were located in the parish of St. Dunstan, Stepney. Their church was St. Dunstan's West, on Fleet Street not far from Blackfriar bridge, a Christopher Wren building which remains intact.

Thomas Robinson, of Cecil County (Maryland) became a merchant shipper, and may have been the one who appears in the port books for Liverpool regarding trips between Liverpool, Maryland and Pennsylvania from 1704 to 1715.

The Robinsons of Barbados:

The Barbados records contain several references to a Thomas Robinson. He and John Robinson and Benjamin Rawlins witnessed the will of Thomas Cason 10 Sep 1700, which named "friends Thomas Robinson and Christopher Webb." This may have been the mariner/merchant Thomas Robinson, probably not resident in Barbados. Thomas Robinson witnessed the will of Thomas Locksmith 5 Sep 1701, and owed money to the estate of Sarah Lynley 10 Nov 1705. Benjamin Robinson's will in 1715 mentioned relatives in Ireland. The account of David Robinson in 1715 mentioned brother Richard and sons of brother Joseph in New York.

The Robinsons of North Carolina:

Thomas and Joseph Robinson were among the first members of Pasquotank Monthly Meeting in North Carolina (later called Symons Creek Meeting), which started in 1698. Thomas married Mary Simons in 1711. The same or another Thomas died in 1719 and his wife Sarah died in 1717. They had children Joseph, Ann and John. There is no evidence that this family had anything to do with the Pennsylvania Robinsons, although it is possible that they did come from there.

The Robinsons of Lancashire:

In 1684, a Thomas Fisher arrived in Pennsylvania aboard the "Vine" of Liverpool, to serve 4 years as one of the servants to the Baker family. A search was made for possible links between this Thomas Fisher and any Robinsons around Liverpool. No links were found, but several Robinsons were found in the parish records. No Robinsons were found in the early Lancashire Quaker records.

Standfield (Francis)

Elizabeth Fisher, wife of Thomas of Chester County, was a grand-daughter of Francis Standfield. She was a daughter of William Huntley and Mary Standfield, daughter of Francis and Grace. The following is an update of portions of the books listed in the frontispiece.

Francis Standfield arrived at Philadelphia July 29, 1683, aboard the ketch "Endeavor" of Liverpool, George Thorpe, Master. The Endeavor was one of the ships that brought many of the original Quaker settlers to the Pennsylvania Province beginning in 1682. William Penn made at least one voyage on the Endeavor, when he returned to England in 1684. Francis and his wife, Grace, brought with them five children, James, Mary, Sarah, Elizabeth, Grace and Hannah; and eight servants, Daniel Browne, Thomas Massey (Marsey), Isa. Brookesby, Robert Sidbotham, John Smith, Robert Bryan, William Rudway and Thomas Sidbotham. A sixth child, Deborah, seems to have been born after the arrival in Pennsylvania.

Francis Standfield married Grace Achele (Achelly) at Worcester Monthly Meeting, about 1661. On June 3, 1678 Mary Achelly (almost certainly a sister of Grace) married Francis Fincher of the City of Worcester. This was a second marriage for Francis Fincher, who had married (--). The Achelly family may have been related to Grace Ashall of Up Holland near Liverpool, where one of the Lancashire Fisher families lived.

The Standfields are usually described as Cheshire people, but they were among a group of Quaker families from around Worcester who came early to Pennsylvania and were associates in Chester County. In 1670, Francis Fincher had all his goods consficated at Grafton-Flyford near Worcester, for attending a Quaker meeting at the house of George Maris. George Maris spent a time in prison, and in 1683 came to Pennsylvania and settled in Springfield Township, Chester County. Francis Standfield had also been subjected to religious persecution in England, and was arrested in 1670 for attending a meeting at "Cartop" in Derbyshire, which was almost certainly the village of Cutthorpe in the parish of Brampton near Chesterfield. (I mistakenly identified it as Carthorpe in Yorkshire in previous books.) Others who were arrested with Francis Standfield were from Brampton. Brampton is about 15 miles southeast of Marple (in Cheshire near Manchester), where Grace Standfield Jr. was born in 1673. In August of 1682 James Standfield, son of Francis and Grace, signed a certificate of removal for a group leaving the Congleton meeting in Cheshire with intent to emigrate to Falls Monthly Meeting in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. Brampton is a little over 20 miles east northeast of Congleton.

Francis Standfield, a Quaker, was listed as "husbandman" (farmer) when he arrived in Pennsylvania. The Standfields were listed as immigrants from "Garton in Cheshire," although no village of that name has ever been listed. This may have referred to Gorton near Manchester (then Lancashire,) being very near the Cheshire line. It may be a mistake for Garston, a village on the Mersey River southwest of Manchester, at the lower end of Lancashire (now Merseyside). They had lived at Marthill and Marple, Cheshire, and possibly at Cutthorpe in Brampton Parish, Derbyshire, as well as places in Worcester.

Francis Standfield may have been descended from the Yorkshire Stansfield family, who were early Quakers in and around Halifax Parish, in the West Riding of Yorkshire. The Stansfield manor house still stands, in the village of Stansfield near Halifax.

The Standfields were among the earliest settlers of the township of Marple, just west of Philadelphia between Darby Creek and Crum Creek. Their tract was not far from that of Francis Fincher of Springfield Township, presumed brother-in-law of Grace Standfield, and their friend George Maris from Cheshire. Thomas Achele, across the Delaware at Burlington, was a probable relative. Francis and son had numerous land holdings and were active in the community. Francis was an assemblyman for Chester County in 1685, and son James gained wealth and prominance until his untimely death in the 1699 yellow fever epidemic. Grace died in 1691 and Francis followed a year later.

James Standfield joined William Penn's Free Society of Traders and began a career as a merchant trader. He had a two-masted brigantine, the "Betsy," which his executor (brother-in-law Francis Chadsey) sold to John Hart, a Society member.

In 1693 Griffith Jones, a Philadelphia merchant, sold part of his Delaware bank lot in Philadelphia to James Standfield, also a merchant of Philadelphia. It was a narrow lot on Front Street and extending to the east into the river. It lay about 200 feet north of High Street, and was probably the berth for the Standfield brigantine, the "Betsy." In 1697 he bought a similar frontage from William Jenner on the opposite side of Front Street, extending to the west instead of east. The lot is shown on the map made by Albert Cook Meyer's committee in commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the first arrival of William Penn. The map is reproduced in "History of an Old Philadelphia Land Title." It can be seen from the map that Joseph Fisher, immigrant from Ireland in 1683, had a Delaware lot only 200 feet north of the Standfield frontage.

In 1699 James Stanfield of Philadelphia, son of Francis and Grace (Achele) Standfield of Marple in Chester County, left a detailed will and estate accounting that mentioned business in Maryland and Boston, his brigantine two-master the "Betsy," Jerimiah Collett and the names of various sea captains. His niece Elizabeth Huntley would later marry Thomas Fisher in Chester County, and Nathan Baker, immigrant on the "Vine" in 1684, would marry Sarah Collett, daughter of Jeremiah Collett.

The Tract in Kennett Abandoned by the Heirs of Francis Standfield

Land records of Chester County reveal that during the 1690's James Standfield laid out, for the heirs of Francis Standfield, a large tract of land in Kennett, Chester County. The tract was abandoned with no survey when James died in 1699. John Hope, brother-in law of his sister Elizabeth, acquired two parcels from this tract. The 1692 will of Francis Standfield, which was once recorded in Philadelphia Book D, is lost, and the names of heirs other than his children are not known.

Edward Bennett married Sarah Standfield, daughter of Francis and Grace. John Bennett, son of John Bennett of Oversey, County of Worcester, married Ann Brinton of Stourbridge 1684, 4m, 18, Worcester Monthly Meeting. Ann Brinton was the daughter of William Brinton of Nether Gornal in the parish of Sedgely, Staffordshire. The Brinton, Bennett, Fincher, Maris and Standfield families were all friends in Cheshire and Worcester and all came to Chester County.

A house and lot in Philadelphia was acquired from Thomas Wynne by John and Margaret Fisher when they arrived from Lancashire in 1682 or early 1683. The house was a cave-like structure built into the Delaware River bank, and was the residence of John and Margaret until they moved to Sussex County in 1685. The

house was deeded to Samuel Atkins by John Fisher in 1683, probably on the occasion of Samuel Atkin's marriage to Annie Fisher, daughter of John and Margaret Fisher. When the Standfield estates and trading company were liquidated after James Standfield's death in 1699, one of the assets mentioned was a part interest in the house of Samuel Atkins. Samuel may have died at the same time as James Standfield, since no record of him can be found after 1699. Both apparently succumbed to the yellow fever epidemic of 1699. In the James Standfield estate settlement, there is a payment to the "surgeon in Samuel Atkins' house." The house was almost certainly the very same as the one in the Delaware River Bank, in effect a cave, where John and Margaret Fisher from Lancashire spent their first winter.

The Atkins house is one of several links between John and Margaret Fisher and the Standfields. The Fishers of Sussex County were in the process of buying a large tract of land there from James Standfield when James died. A bond of 150 pounds was due from William and Thomas Fisher of Sussex County, and court records mention a complaint that the Fishers should pay. These connections could be taken as a link with Thomas Fisher of Chester County, but do not make a strong case for a kinship.

It has been reported that Samuel Atkins took James Standfield as an apprentice to learn the shipping trade. (Source unknown.) He bought land near the original Standfield estate in Marple. Samuel divided his time between Sussex County and Philadelphia, and arranged leases of whaling vessels for companies such as that of John McGiver. Samuel's business sometimes took him on return trips to England. In 1699, Samuel Atkins sold his land in Marple to John Worral, who was the Standfield's neighbor to the north, where the present-day "Worral Estates" are located. James Standfield and Samuel Atkins may have died together at their shared house on the Philadelphia waterfront.

Other possible family ties: The Standfield (Stansfield) family seat in Halifax Parish, West Yorkshire, was only a few miles from Clitheroe in Lancashire, where John Fisher and the Hindles lived before their emigration. The Standfields brought a crate of window glass when they came, which would have been needed by the glazier John Fisher. The Standfields had an active trading company, and had large acreage in Sussex County where the John Fishers family lived. The ship-building supplies and artisans mentioned in the John Fisher family tradition could have been associated with the two-masted ship, the brigantine "Betsy," owned by the trading company. A "carpenter's shipyard" was located on one of the Fisher tracts in Sussex County.

The Holmes map of the Marple area shows the Francis Standfield estate house in the north-east end of the Standfield 600-acre tract. The site has been identified with two different homesites which can be located today. A house on Crum Creek Road near Marple Road has been discovered to have been built around a two-story log structure. Another residence, a two-story brick house on McClarie Street nearby is also sometimes considered to be on the site of a Standfield house.

At a Quarterly Meeting of Friends held 3 mo 3 1686 it was "Agreed yt a meeting be kept at John Bolters (Bowater's) upon ye same first day it was used to be at Bartholomew Coppocks, for ye ease of such yt live westerly in ye woods and ye rest of friends living ye other way, upon yt same day, to meet at ffrancis Stanfields until further consideration."

At a Quarterly Meeting held 6 mo 2 1683, it was "Agreed yt ye meeting at Francis Stanfields, upon fresh consideration be Removed to Bartholomew Coppock's ye younger, to begin ye next first day and ye following 4th day untill friends se cause to remove it."

Francis Stanfield was a member of the Pennsylvania Assembly from Chester County in 1685. He died in 1692. His wife died a year earlier.

Children of Francis and Grace (--) Stanfield (Note: She was Grace Achele, mar. Francis Standfield, Worcester MM)

- 1. James Stanfield, d. 1699; m. Mary Hutchinson, of Burlington, New Jersey, 1689.
- 2. Mary Stanfield, m. William Huntly, 1692 and had children, 1 Elizabeth, 2 Francis, 3 Deborah, 4 Mary, 5 Sarah. She married, 2nd, Richard Fletcher, 1713.
- 3. Sarah Stanfield, m. 1st, William Clows or Clews, of Bucks County. She m. 2d, Edward Bennett, of Thornbury, and had children, 1 Edward, 2 Sarah, 3 Joseph, 4 William, 5 Elizabeth.
- 4. Elizabeth Stanfield, m. 1st Thomas Hope, 1697. He died 1708. She married, 2d, William Horne, 1709. He died 1743. No children.
- 5. Grace Stanfield, m. 1st Francis Chads, 1695, and had children, 1 Sarah, 2 John, 3 Grace, 4 Betty, 5 Ann, 6 Francis. She m. 2d Guyon Stevenson, 7 mo 16, 1714. She died 1728.
- 6. Hannah Stanfield, m. Isaac Few, 1699.
- 7. Deborah Stanfield, m. Richard Woodward, Jr., 1701. She was the second wife of Richard Woodward, (who was four times married) and was the mother of most if not all his twelve children.

Taylor

Joseph Taylor, son of Joseph Taylor and grandson of Abiah Taylor who came from Didcot in Berkshire, settled on Pocopsin Creek a little to the north of Thomas Fisher in 1724. At about that time he bought 50 acres further south, from Ruth Harland (widow of Ezekiel), which touched on part of the north side of Thomas Fisher's land.

Joseph Taylor's estate settlement of 1740 mentioned payments due from James Fisher (1 shilling threepence) and Thomas Fisher (1 shilling).

Thatcher

When Thomas Fisher obtained a patent on his land in Kennett in 1739, one of the neighbors on the northwest side of his land was Zerobable Thatcher. Zerobable was from the same family as Richard, Joseph and Jonathan Thatcher, early immigrants to Pennsylvania.

Jonathan Thatcher arrived in Pennsylvania in 1685 aboard the "Bristol Merchant." Most of the passengers were from Ireland, but Jonathan Thatcher is believed to have been born about 1645 at Uffington, Berkshire in England. He died about 1722. George Fisher came on the same ship, as a servant to Jaspar Farmer, who settled in Philadelphia County. John and Katharine Robinson also came on the same ship, as servants to Thomas Webb and son Daniel.

Zerubabbel Thatcher settled next to Thomas Fisher about 1727, and is believed to be a son of Richard or Jonathan Thatcher of Thornbury and Birmingham, on the east side of the Brandywine. George Fisher came on the same ship, as a servant to Jaspar Farmer, who settled in Philadelphia County. Jaspar Farmer came from a village on the Cork harbor, in the south of Ireland, before emigrating, and had belonged to the Youghal Monthly Meeting. John and Katharine Robinson came on the same ship, as servants to Thomas Webb and son Daniel. It is not known if they were related to Thomas Robinson, the Kennett landowner.

Zerubabbel Thatcher died in 1749 and his wife Sarah died the following year. The will of Sarah Thatcher, wife of Zerubabbel, stated that Sarah was a cousin of Phebe Prichard. Phebe Prichard signed in the "relatives" column of the marriage certificate when Elizabeth Fisher, daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth of Chester County, married Joseph Wilkinson at Kennett Monthly Meeting in 1740.

The Thatcher tract went to Richard, son of Zerubabbel and Sarah. It was consficated in a sheriff's sale in 1763, reason unknown. No record of any kind can be found showing how the Thatchers had acquired the 100 acres from the old Wallis tract. A warrant does exist granting them the upper 39 acres. It has been suggested that Sarah was a daughter of Richard Arnold. The land may have been an inheritance from Samuel Pyle in some way, without a deed or will.

Wallis

A tract of 515 acres was surveyed in Kennett for James Wallis in March of 1701, only a few days after the Robinson/Fisher warrant was granted. The Wallis tract was on the west and south sides of the Robinson/Fisher tract. These two tracts were among the first to be surveyed in the neighborhood.

In 1700 James Wallis, merchant of Bristol, England obtained a warrant from William Penn for 500 acres in Kennett, in right of his purchase in England of 1000 acres in Pennsylvania. Thomas Withers of Chichester, formerly of Bristol, was agent for James Wallis. In 1702, Thomas Withers was authorized to sell the whole tract to John Smith, clock maker of Chester County. John Smith sold it to Nicholas Pyle in 1712. About 1729, Zerobabel Thatcher somehow obtained 100 acres from the Pyles at the north end of the tract, but no record has been found. In 1751, the heirs of Nicholas Pyle sold the lower 301 acres to William Webb. Zerobabel Thatcher obtained 39 more acres of the Wallis tract (on the north side of the 100 acres) by warrant, in 1736. The remaining 75 acres (of the 515), was lopped off in 1718, becoming part of Ezekiel Harlan's 340-acre tract on the north side of the Wallis and Robinson/Fisher tracts.

James Wallis was the only adjoining property owner next to Thomas Fisher when the Penn grant was given to Thomas Fisher and Thomas Robinson in early 1701.

A partial history of the Wallis tract is given in a 1754 deed:

Deed. On 30 May 1751 William Webb of Kennett, & Rebecca his wife, to William Webb, Jr. of Kennett, women. Whomas the commissioners of William Penn by deed dated 12 Oct 1702 greated to James.

yeoman. Whereas the commissioners of William Penn by deed dated 12 Oct 1702 granted to James Wallace of Bristoll a tract in Kennett containing 515 acres, being part of 1000 acres which William Penn granted to James Wallace in the year 1681, recorded in Philadelphia, Book A, vol 2, Page 381. Whereas James Wallace by Letter of Attorney dated 22 Sep 1688, recorded in Philadelphia, Book D2, vol 5, Page 24, appointed Thomas Withers his attorney to sell said lands. Whereas Thomas Withers by deed dated 24 Nov 1702 granted to John Smith of Chester County, clock maker the said 515 acres. John Smith made his will dated 30 Dec 1706 & devised to his wife Mary, the said 515 acres. Whereas Mary has since married John Borough, yeoman, who by their deed dated 22 & 23 June 1712 granted the 515 acres to Nicholas Pyle. Nicholas Pyle made his will dated 6 Oct 1715 & amongst other things devised to his son Samuel a tract containing 257 ½ acres, located on the southern end of the said tract in Kennett, also giving Samuel L27 when he turns 21 years & devised to his other son Joseph, the other moiety of the said 515 acres, being 257 ½ acres & L27 when he turns 21 years. If either son shall die before the age of 21 the survivor shall have the whole 515 acres. The said Nickolas Pyle soon after died. Whereas Joseph Pyle died underage, and the whole estate came to Samuel Pyle. Whereas Samuel Pyle granted 301 acres of the 515 acres to William Webb. Now William Webb, Sr. & Rebecca his wife for the natural love they bear their son, grant to William Webb, Jr. a tract in Kennett bounded by land of William Harry, land of Zerobable Thatcher, other land of William Webb, Daniel Webb & Joshua Pierce, containing 246 acres. Signed William Webb & Rebecca Webb. Delivered in the presence of Daniel Webb, Jacob Tagart & Jeremiah Cloud. Recorded 6 Nov 1751. (H8:231).

James Wallis, a merchant of Bristol, married Mary Gouldney, daughter of Thomas Gouldney, 1678, 9 Mo 20, at Bristol Monthly Meeting (Quakers). The Gouldneys were the leading merchants of Bristol at the time. James Wallis was the son of William Wallis, late of Oxford. A son James was born 1679, 9 Mo 8, at Bristol. Daughter Mary was born 1681, 5 Mo 12 in Stephens Parish, Castle Green, Bristol. The first two children apparently died young, as James and Mary had another daughter Mary, born 1691, 4 Mo 18 at Castle Green and son James, born 1692, 9 Mo 20 at Castle Green, Bristol. A third son, Ezekiel, was born at Castle Green 1694, 8 Mo 22. Henry Gouldney came to Pennsylvania and was one of a trio of wealthy merchants who bailed out William Penn from a large debt. The entire province was thereby actually mortgaged to Henry Gouldney & company.

James Wallis became a shipper who chartered voyages to America and the West Indies from Bristol, Virginia being his usual destination. In 1685, he joined Francis Fisher of Bristol, master of the

"Alexander," bound from Bristol to Virginia, at sea September 5-23. He was one of the shippers on the "James and Mary," at sea from Bristol to Virginia September 1-27, 1699. He joined with shippers in 1701 aboard the "James and Mary," Jeremiah Pearce, master, bound from Bristol to Pennsylvania and Virginia, asea May 15-26.

James Wallis formed a company consisting of himself, Richard Crosby, Charles Jones Jr. and Thomas Taylor. They bought up tracts of land in Pennsylvania and began selling parts. James Wallis obtained 1000 acres (two tracts) in Chester County, one of which was next to Thomas Fisher in Kennett Township.. The company together owned a plantation tract in Kent County called Whittwells Chance on the north side of Duck Creek.

In 1718, disaster befell the Bristol company. On February 10, 1718, the administration of estates for James Wallis, Richard Crosby, Charles Jones Jr. and Thomas Taylor was assigned to John Bradshaw of Kent County, all on the same day. It seems apparent that their ship must have been lost at sea.

Way

The Way family lived about a mile southeast of Thomas Fisher in Kennett, and about a mile north of William Huntley. The Way family probably came from Marlborough in Wiltshire, before 1686. Robert Way settled on 150 acres in eastern Kennet Township, now Pennsbury, and died there in 1725. His wife was Hannah Hickman, daughter of Francis and Elizabeth Hickman from Marlborough in Wiltshire.

Withers

In 1700, William Withers of Chichester Township obtained a warrant for a tract of 100 acres abutting the west end of vacant land which would become the Huntley tract in 1703. This was about 1½ miles southeast of the Fisher tract. In 1712, the Withers tract went to Thomas, son of William Withers. It was then sold to John Packer.

Thomas Withers was agent for James Wallis of Bristol, who was the original grantee of the 515-acre tract on the west side of Robinson and Fisher in Kennett. Thomas Withers conducted both the buying and the selling of the Wallis tract, and James Wallis probably never lived in Pennsylvania.

Thomas Withers of Aust Coy, Glocestershire, son of William Withers of Cannings, married Jane Smith of Gredidge, at Olveston Monthly Meeting in 1661. William and Thomas Withers may have lived in Bristol prior to their immigration. They lived in Chichester Township in Chester County where they were members of Concord Monthly Meeting as early as 1687.

VII. Updates to Previous Books

New Information

This book contains new information with respect to my previous books, listed at the beginning of this volume. Some notable examples:

- Mrs. Robert Fisher (Sophie) of Flint, Michigan heard of my research and sent the 1701 land warrant for Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher, pushing back the known records by 12 more years. She also found and provided the patent and resurvey to Thomas Fisher of the same land in 1739, and provided Fisher land records for the tracts in Caln Township. I found Thomas Fisher's quitrent records in the microfilmed rent rolls in the Mormon Family History Library, showing that he paid 38 years of back quitrent to the sons of William Penn in 1739, with Thomas Robinson's name struck from the roll.
- I did not know about the 1703 warrant and survey in Kennett for William Huntley, and did not know that the Huntley tract was the one labeled as "William Harvey" in Gilbert Cope's 1911 map. I speculated incorrectly that the Huntley and Fisher farms in Kennett were the same.
- I thought the lower segment of Thomas Fisher's tract in Kennett was marked "J Fisher" on the Gilbert Cope map, and concluded it was for James, son of Thomas. The mark actually says "T" Fisher and that segment was never set aside for James.
- I speculated that Thomas Fisher of Chester County may have been a son of Dennis and Susannah Fisher of Salem, West Jersey. There is no reason to assume any connection.
- I speculated that Thomas Fisher of Chester County may have been a son of James Fisher of Sussex County (who was a son of John and Margaret Fisher). No evidence has been found to support this.
- Susan Kimura of West Jordan, Utah provided a discovery in the Gilbert Cope Collection, LDS Film 0517034, and records of Worcester Monthly Meeting (LDS Film 0441397) regarding the Standfields. Francis Standfield married Grace Achele at Worcestershire Monthly Meeting. Her sister Mary married Francis Fincher of the City of Worcester. The descendants of Francis Standfield and Francis Fincher found in the Philadelphia and Chester County records were therefore cousins. Thomas Achelly of Burlington, New Jersey, was a relative.
- Susan Kimura provided, from the Miscellaneous Records of the Chester Co. Pa. Historical Society, Surnames "F", LDS Film 0565685, an anonymous manuscript "Fishers of Kendall, Westmoreland & Delaware, "which gives an interesting ancestry for John Fisher of Clitheroe. If it is correct, John Fisher was educated in law at Gray's Inn in London, and was a class-mate there with John Hindle, brother of John Fisher's wife Margaret. Susan discovered, on LDS Film 567014, "Notes on Immigrants to Pa. 1681-1737," Albert C. Myers, a 1684 record from Marsden Monthly Meeting in Lancashire stating that the meeting was sending the children of John Fisher to Pennsylvania, two years after the parents and one or more older children came.
- Susan Kimura found a description of the ancient Stansfield family manor house in Stansfield, West Yorkshire, which still stands.
- A. R. (Rich) Paul of the Marple-Newtown Historical Society sent a newspaper picture and article showing an ancient log structure, about to be razed in the 1960's, on the old Huntley tract in Marple, part of the original Francis Standfield estate.

- I have now found a record of James Standfield in the Quaker records of Cheshire. He attended a wedding at Congleton Monthly Meeting, Cheshire in early 1683, shortly before the Standfield family emigration.
- The passenger list for the "Endeavor" in 1683, listing the Standfield family, says they came from "Garton, in Cheshire." There is no such place name in Cheshire, now or in the old place name books. I assumed this meant Gorton, in east central Manchester, since it is not far from Marple at the edge of Cheshire, where the Standfields once lived. But Gorton and Manchester were part of Lancashire and never were part of Cheshire. I now wonder if this was a mistake for Garston, near Liverpool in Lancashire, where the Standfields might have stopped briefly while waiting to depart from Liverpool. Garston happens to be the birthplace of Thomas Fisher who came to Pennsylvania with the Baker family in 1684.
- A descendant of George Rogers sent me a land map showing the location of Cephas Fisher Sr.'s land in Indiana. The map is shown in this chapter.
- My wife Janice and I traveled to Henry County, Iowa where we found land records and maps pinpointing the location of the Fisher and Vantassell farms there. A map showing the land tracts, and a photo of the 1867 homesite of Cephas Fisher, are included in this chapter.
- Noble Shaw, a first cousin, traveled to Green County, Tennessee and sent a picture of the New Hope Quaker house near Rheatown, established in 1795, where Cephas Fisher Sr. (Great Grandson of Thomas Fisher of Chester County) was married in 1803. The photos are included in this chapter.
- John Fisher, a fifth cousin, learned of my research and sent a collection of photographs of some of the Ohio descendants of Thomas Fisher of Chester County. A sample is included at the end of this chapter.

Cephas Fisher Sr. & Jr. in Ohio

With the expanded set of records I now have, the family history in Ohio is much clearer. The earliest evidence in the Ohio records is the purchase in the spring of 1806 of 197 acres in Highland County by James Fisher (father of Cephas Sr.), from Philip Huff of Ohio County, Virginia. Huff had received the land as a set-aside in the "Virginia Reserve" for revolutionary war veterans. The land was deeded in 1824 from James Fisher to Cephas Fisher Sr. By 1811 their brother Thomas had settled a little to the north in the part of Highland County that became Fayette County. Cephas Jr. was born in Madison Township, Highland County near East Monroe in 1812, and stayed on his father's farm there until age 25.

In 1837, Cephas Sr. moved a few miles northwest into Clinton County and built a large log house just south of Lees Creek, in Greene Township. The log house stood until 1905, when one of the Fishers (Henry) was killed by a falling beam in the process of taking it down. John Fisher, brother of Cephas Jr., inherited the property and built a large brick house there which can still be seen just off highway 729 about 3 miles south of Lees Creek.

On August 31, 1837, Cephas Jr. married Mary Hoskins, daughter of George and Mary Hoskins. They were married by a Justice of the Peace in a civil ceremony, which would have caused trouble among their Quaker families. Cephas Jr. and Mary appear in no land records for a number of years, and may have settled on his father's farm near Lees Creek or that of his uncle Thomas nearby in Fayette County. Eleven years later, in 1848, Cephas Jr. and Mary bought their own farm a few miles to the east, in Fayette County, Concord Township, and settled with there.

Cephas Fisher Jr.'s deed, from Columbus Mountjoy and Bathsheba his wife of Highland County to Cephas A. Fisher, describes the land as being 50 acres on the intersection of Sabina Road and old Charleston Road, in the northwest side of the intersection. I could find no connection between Bathsheba Mountjoy and the Fishers and do not know if this land had anything to do with Cephas Jr.'s uncle Thomas who also lived in

Fayette County. Christopher Columbus Mountjoy was born in Kentucky about 1813. He and his wife Bathsheba went to Keokuk in southeastern Iowa and operated a hotel there by 1860. Cephas Fisher Jr. and his wife Mary went to Clinton County, Indiana about 1851 but by 1867 they had also moved to southeast Iowa in Henry County, not far from Keokuk.

I now have the missing 1850 census for Cephas Fisher Jr. The census-taker had mistakenly written "Stephan Fisher" for Cephas Jr., but the family is correctly enumerated. Cephas ("Stephan") and wife Mary are listed with children Rachel, George M., Josephus, Eli, John W., Benjamin F., Lewis, and Samuel. The place was Concord Township, Fayette County, Ohio, Berlin Post Office. (This Berlin no longer exists & I have not found where it was exactly.)

Fisher, his heirs and assigns forever, the following premises, situate in the County of Fayette in the State of Ohio, and in John Nicholas Survey No. 7365 and bounded and described as follows.

Beginning at a stake & two pigeon oaks in the Charlestown road thence with said road N20'15" E 48 poles to a stake Jack oak & thence in the center of the aforesaid road thence S88'W175 ½ poles to a stake in the Sabina road S44'15" E 70 ½ poles with said road to a stake thence N88'E 132 poles to the beginning containing fifty acres be the same more or less.

To have and to hold said premises with the appurtenances unto the said Cephas A. Fisher, his heirs and assigns forever And the said Columbus Mountjoy & Bathsheba his wife for them selves and heirs do hereby covenant with said Cephas A. Fisher his heirs and assigns that they are lawfully seized of the premises aforesaid; and that the premises are free and clear from all incumbrances whatsoever; and that they will forever warrant and defend the same, with the appurtenances unto the said Cephas A. Fisher, his heirs and assigns against the lawful claims of all persons whom occur.

In Testimony whereof the said Columbus Mountjoy and Bathsheba his wife who hereby relinquishes her right of dower in the premises have hereunto set their hands and seals this nineteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand Eight hundred and forty Eight. Item 1st I give and devise to Mary Hoskins my beloved wife in Lieu of her dower the farm on which we now Live in the Township of Green and County and State aforesaid containing fifty acres during her lifetime if she so long remains my widow. But when she Shall Cease to be my widow the Said land to revert back to my Lawful heirs as hereinafter provisioned. Also all the household and kitchen fixtures Beds and bedding the choice Cow and poultry that may be on hand at the Time of my death and one hundred Dollars in Cash (over) one years support.

- 2nd I bequeath to my Son Joseph Hoskins two dollars he having heretofore received his full portion of my estate.
- 3rd I give and devise to my daughter Mary Fisher two dollars.
- 4th I give and bequeath to my daughter Hannah Summers one hundred dollars and to my daughter Ruth Black two hundred dollars.
- 5th It is my will that my Executor at my death Sell all my personal property as the Law dictates in such cases. Also all the Real estate owned by me at my death except that which is bequeathed to my wife either at public or private sale for cash or upon credit as he may think best.

6th It is my will that all my funeral expenses and of my last Sickness be paid and all my Just Debts and the residue from the Said sales when collected by my executor to be equally divided between the heirs of Mary Fisher (they receiving her equal part) George Hoskins Hannah Summer, Eli Hoskins and Ruth Black. And further I hold a certificate of stock calling for four shares of \$50.00 each in the Mascetta & Cincinnati Rail Road which is to go equally to the above named heirs.(Mary Fisher's heirs receiving her part).

7th At the death of my Said Wife or when She Ceases to be my widow the farm which is heretofore bequeathed to her is to be Sold and when the money is collected to be paid equally (to the heirs of Mary Fisher they receiving her part), George Hoskins, Hannah Summers, Eli Hoskins and Ruth Black.

TO HAVE & TO HOLD the said One Hundred and Ninety-nine and a half Acres of Land and Premises hereby granted (except as before excepted) with their appurtenances unto the said Thomas Fisher, his Heirs & Assigns To the only Use and Behoof of the said Thomas Fisher, his Heirs & Assigns Forever TO BE HOLDEN of us, of our Heirs & Successors Proprietaries of Pennsilvania as of our Mannor of Springton in the County aforesaid of Chester in free & Common Socage by Fealty only in lieu of all other Services.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the said Thomas Penn by virtue of the power and Authorities to him granted by the said John and Richard Penn and of his own right hath caused the great seal of the said province to be hereunto affixed at Philadelphia this sixteenth Day of January in the Year of our Lord One thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty-Nine, the thirteenth Year of the Reign of King George the Second over Great Britain, etc. And the Twenty Second Year of our government – Tho. Penn (seal) accorded the 16th day of March Anno Domini 1739/40.

At the court held 11th month 6, 1684 (January 1685), an action appears, Justa Anderson vs. Laurentius Carolus and James Saunderlaine, "for weakning and disparaging his Title of Land." The plaintiff had purchased of the said Lasse Carolus his house and land at Upland several years before. Brantie Everts, aged five-and-fifty years, deposed at New Castle, September 5th, that he was present when the sale was made. Evert Alderts testified before Thomas Usher, October 2d, that he was present when Lasse Carolus sold to Justice Anderson "all his Land and Houses on Upland, both whome (home) lotts and woodland," and that Anderson was to give eight hundred guilders for the same. He further stated before Robert Wade, October 8th, that on Monday, the "6th Instant, Lasse Carolus the Prist, Come to his house In West Jersey" and tried to persuade him "to give him in writting that he had sold unto Justa Anderson butt his house and Hog Stye with the Erse belonging to ye same In Upland." Edmund Cantwell testified at New Castle, October 18th, that several years before, when he was collector of the duke's quit-rents, he was at Upland and demanded the rent from Lasse Carolus for his land where he lived, and for his house and land in Upland Towne, when he informed the deponent that he had sold the latter to Anderson. "John Grubb, about thirty two years of Age deposes that about four years agoe he had a minde to buy the Woodland lott that Lasse Carolus had in Vpland, being Two hundred Acres of the aforesd Lasse, the Sweeds Prist." George Moore deposed, December 23d, that "he heard James Saunderlaine did say, coming into ye house of Justa Anderson, yt what thinke you! Lasse Carolus would have sold your land to John Grub had it not been for me."

The verdict was in favor of the plaintiff, whith cost of suit and twelve pounds damage; "upon which ye Defendants make their Appeale to the next Cort of Assize held for this County." Records of the Courts of Chester Co., Pa., also Futhey/Cope History of Chester Co. Pa., pg. 27.

Isaac Few, son of Richard and Jane Few, was born 4 mo. 6, 1664, in Wiltshire, England. When about 18 years of age, he came to Pennsylvania with his father. At a Monthly Meeting held at the house of Walter ffaucets, 2 mo 1, 1689, "Isaack ffew belonging to this meeting proposed his intenshion of marrige with Jane Theacher Daughter of Richard Thecher belonging to Chechester monthly meeting." A committee was appointed, but no further mention is made of the matter by either Meeting. * Note Jane Thacher married William Brinton in 1690.

Isaac Few married Hannah Stanfield, a daughter of Francis and Grace Stanfield, in 1699. The following are the Friends minutes relating thereto, "at a monthly meeting held at John Edges one ye 27th of ye 12th month 1689-90. Isaac few & hannah Standfielld belonging to this meeting propos'd thayr Intention of taking Each other as husband and wife this being the first time and randall vernon & Andrew Job is Appoynted for to make Inauirey conserning his Clearness and for to make report thereof to the nixt monthly meeting."

"At a monthly meeting held at randall Vernons one ye 27th day of ye 1th mo 1699. Isaac few and hanah Standfielld belonging this meeting this being ye second time and Inauirey being made and nothing appering for to obstruct them in thayr sd Intentions they are therefor left to thyr liberty for to proceed acording to the good order of truth."

Isaac Few inherited 220 acres in Chester Township, from his father, and continued to reside there for several years, but in 1708 he had removed to Kennett (now Pennsbury) Township. This being within the limits of Newark Monthly Meeting, he and his wife

transferred their membership to that Meeting in 1709. The record of the births of their children, and other mention, are found in the minutes of this Meeting.

Isaac Few died in 1734, aged about 70 years. Letters of administration were granted to his son James, (Richard the elder son having renounced.) October 23, 1734.

- 8. Francis Few, b. 1 mo 25 1722. He went to parts unknown.

James Few, son of Isaac and Hannah (Stanfield) Few, was born 12 mo 28 1703, probably in Chester Township. James Few and Dorcas Matthews "Laid their intentiens of marriage before "the Monthly Meeting on 4 m 4 1725, and 4 mo 29 1725, and were left "to their Liberty to accomplish the same." The marriage was "Accomplished according to good order," at Kennett Meeting, 5 mo 14 1725. Those who signed the marriage certificate as relatives were the following, Isaac ffew, Richd ffew, Mary ffletcher, Eliz Horn, Eliz ffew, Ann Mathews, and Issac ffew Ju.

They settled in Kennett Township. From the report of the resurvey of the road leading from Chads' Ford through Kennett Square, made Feb 19, 1742/3, it appears that he lived about a mile and a half from the Ford. It is shown that after leaving the creek, it passed through land of Thomas Hope, about 266 perches; William Harvey, 115 perches, (passing near the school house); then across James Few, N. 78 W., 18 perches to a b. o.; N. 82 W., 40; S 88 W., 74, to a stump near his house; N. 85 W., 74, to a stump near the old school house; then crossing John Hope, etc. Further on they came to a black oak near Elizabeth McNeal's Brew house, (Anvil Tavern?), and then after crossing other properties struck her land before reaching what is now Kennett Square.

James Few disappears from the tax-list of Kennett for 1747, and subsequently. Perhaps he moved to New Castle County, Delaware, and died there at a period for which the wills are lost.

JOHN ROBINSON

John ROBINSON was born near Scrooby, Nottinghamshire, England, 1575, d. at Leyden, Netherlands, Mar 1, 1636. His grandson, John ROBINSON, settled at Marcus Hook near Chester, Pa., and became father of another John who married Miram Wade, grandniece of Robert Wade. Came from New England about the time of the Quaker persecutions. The census of Leyden, 1622, shows that the Rev. John ROBINSON had at least three sons, John, Isaac and Jacob. (Babson's History of Gloucester, Mass.)

In possession of this family for at least four generations, and probably more, was a seal ring with a coat of arms; - Three stags and a chevron, with three quatre-foils upon a shield of green and gold, and crest, a stag. The Heralds College in London, Eng., states that a family of ROBINSONs bear these arms. Magazine of American History, vol. Xv., p. 511-512.

This is in Futhey/Cope under "Bennett." John Bennett was in Birmingham taxables, 1715 and THOMAS ROBINSON was in Kennett, 1715. John & Edward Bennett came from Overly, Worcestershire in 1684. George ROBINSON and Nathaniel Newlin were both in Concord taxables, 1715. Nathaniel Newlin, son of Nicholas, came from Mountmellick, Queens County, Ireland, in 1683. THOMAS ROBINSON OF MARYLAND

The Robinsons and Fishers of Maryland were studied in detail to determine if either of them may have had connections to Pennsylvania. It was discovered that several Fisher families were in Maryland earlier than the Pennsylvania Fishers, and numerous Robinsons were also there from an early date. The results of that study were documented in a separate book, "The First Fishers of Chesapeake Bay," which is in work as of this writing. For a time I was hopeful that Thomas Robinson of Cecil County, Maryland was connected to the Fishers of Chester County. The following summary contains references to possible connections to Fisher families, but none proved to be meaningful.

Robinson is one of the most commonly occurring surnames in the British Isles and the English colonies. It is very difficult to separate the Robinson families. Thomas Robinson of Cecil County (Maryland) became a merchant shipper, making many trips between Liverpool, Maryland and Pennsylvania from 1704 to 1715. In the early 1700's Thomas Robinson, merchant and sea captain of Cecil County, Maryland, a few miles from the border with Chester County, Pennsylvania, belonged to St. Stephen's Anglican Church in Sassafrass Parish. William and Mary Fisher and son Joseph belonged to the same church at the same time.

In 1697 Captain Thomas Robinson, merchant, ship commander and shipper of Cecil County in Maryland, former assembly man for Talbot County, married Sarah Frisby of Cecil County, daughter of the merchant James Frisby, formerly of London. Thomas and Sarah went to London for a number of years to conduct the company business, taking with them the younger Frisby children to be educated. Part of Sarah's dowry was land in Cecil County which was assigned to Thomas Robinson by Peregrine Brown, merchant of London. The London Frisbys and Browns were located in the parish of St. Dunstan, Stepney. Their church was St. Dunstan's West, on Fleet Street not far from Blackfriar bridge, a Christopher Wren building which remains intact.

A Thomas Robinson of Cecil County, Maryland died in 1686, and was probably related to the younger Captain Thomas Robinson. In 1693, Thomas Robinson was elected assembly man for Talbot County. In July of 1697, Mr. Thomas Robinson Esquire married Miss Sarah Frisby, daughter of James Frisby Esq. and wife Sarah, in St. Stephens Anglican church, North Sassafras Parish, Cecil County. The Frisby property was mostly on the north side of the Sassafras River, near the church.

Sarah Frisby Sr., mother-in-law of Thomas Robinson, was the former Sarah Abraham, daughter of Isaac Abraham of Talbot County. She was related somehow to the London Peregrine Brown family. In June of 1699, Peregrine Brown of the City of London conveyed 500 acres to Thomas Robinson, merchant of London, being half of "Turkey Point" in Cecil County, on the Sassafras River. The remainder of this property eventually went to the Frisby sons. Since Sarah (Frisby) Robinson had a brother named Peregrine, it is assumed that Peregrine Brown was a relative. Soon after his marriage to Sarah, Thomas Robinson appears to have become a partner of the Browns and Frisbys in their London merchant marine company. Thomas and Sarah Robinson took up residence in London for a time, probably in connection with the family business. A study of the records indicates that Thomas Robinson, Peregrine Brown and James Frisby were all in the business of marketing and transporting tobacco from the Maryland plantations.

In 1706, the records of St. Stephens church in Cecil County show the birth of a son Joseph to William and Mary Fisher. In November of 1712, the records of the same church show the death of John Robinson, a young son of Thomas and Sarah Robinson. This may mean that Thomas and Sarah Robinson had moved back from London to Cecil County.

In 1701, Thomas Robinson arranged a Cecil County land transfer for James Robinson Sr. and Ralph Rutter on Muddy Creek. James Robinson Jr., apparent brother of Thomas Robinson, is probably the one who soon moved to Chester County, Pennsylvania.

For several years beginning in 1700, the Maryland Assembly was concerned with rumors of an impending European war. In 1702, when the tobacco shipping masters were allocated gunpowder rations for defense, Captain Thomas Robinson of Cecil County received 4 quarter barrels.

Thomas Robinson or "Captain Thomas Robinson" was mentioned in administrations for John Eldridge (Cecil County, 1701), Robert Gouldsberry (Ann Arundel County, 1701, also mentions Henry Fish(er) and George Robinson), Henry Riggs (Cecil County, 1702), and Henry Pennington (1702, Cecil County, also mentions Mr. James Frisby).

James Frisby left a Cecil County will in 1702, proved in London, leaving the company sloop to his son-in-law Thomas Robinson. He offered his deceased wife's ring case to his daughter Sarah Robinson if she should "come to inhabit this country." Since Thomas was a "merchant of London" in 1699, it seems clear that Thomas and Sarah were in London, at least from 1699 to 1702. Sarah's relatives, including the Peregrine Brown family, were in London, and Sarah's brothers were being sent to England to be educated. Thomas and Sarah returned before the end of 1712, when the death of their young son John was recorded in the St. Stephens parish records in North Sassafras Parish.

Thomas Robinson of Maryland and London was probably the shipper who made runs between Liverpool and Bristol and the Atlantic provinces, lading at the Chesapeake and Delaware ports. He shipped on the "Lever" from Liverpool to Virginia, Mr. Bryan Blundell, Master, in 1704, with William Basnett, shipper. Thomas Robinson was also a shipper aboard the "Endeavor," Mr. Edward Tarleton, Master, bound from Liverpool to Virginia,in 1705. He shipped in 1707 on the "Thomas and Elizabeth," Mr. Joseph Clayton, Liverpool to Philadelphia in 1709; "Lawrell" Liverpool to Virginia; 1709; "Dolphin", Liverpool to Virginia 1710 with John Pemberton; "Seaflower," 1711 Liverpool to Va.; 1711 "Amity," Liverpool to Virginia; 1712 "Rose," Bristol to Virginia; 1713 "Dolphin," Liverpool to Va.; 1714 "Caesar," Liverpool to Va.; 1715 "Caesar," Liverpool to Virginia; 1715 "Mermaid" Liverpool to Virginia.

Thomas Robinson of Cecil County may have been one of six brothers who appear in the records of Cecil, Talbot, Dorchester and Somerset counties (William, Charles, George, John, Thomas, James and Richard). There were two known sisters (Mary and Margaret).

Thomas Robinson probably shipped tobacco for the Fishers of Maryland. A Francis Fisher was an active shipper and sometimes ship master between 1685 and 1701, who worked the same routes as the shipper Thomas Robinson. This Francis Fisher may have been a descendant of Francis Fisher who came to Virginia with wife Elizabeth (Underwood) in 1652, settling on the Rappahannock River and becoming a county justice before his death in 1656. In 1685, Francis Fisher and James Wallis were both aboard the "Alexander," bound from Bristol to Virginia.

Thomas Robinson of Cecil County, Maryland was resident in London at the time of William Penn's land grant in Kennett, Chester County Pennsylvania, to a Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher. It is possible, but not likely, that the Maryland shipper was on a Maryland visit and went to Philadelphia to apply for the Fisher land warrant. William Penn was in Philadelphia when he signed the warrant, preparing to return to England on the "Endeavor." Both Thomas Robinson and Thomas Fisher were assessed taxes in Kennet in 1715 (the first year of surviving tax records) but only Thomas Fisher appears in the Kennet tax lists thereafter. The tract in Kennet was not more than 30 miles from the Elk River and Sassafras River sites in Cecil County, Maryland where the Fisher and Robinson families were active. Thomas Robinson and his wife Sarah (Frisby) Robinson, the Frisbys and the Browns (in-laws of Sarah) all had land in Cecil County, near the Sassafras River. William Fisher and his wife Mary and son Joseph, and Thomas Robinson and his wife's Frisby relatives were all members of the same church, St. Stephens of North Sassafras Parish. Thomas Robinson of Cecil County and Thomas Fisher of Talbot County (d. 1720) were both captains in the Maryland militia and both were trading merchants. But none of this fits well with Thomas Fisher of Chester County.

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James Stanfield, uncle of Elizabeth Huntley Fisher of Chester County, Pennsylvania, is mentioned in the Maryland inventory of James Dunkan in Somerset County in 1698. Joseph Dunkan is mentioned in the inventory of John Fisher, of Calvert County, in 1704. James Stanfield was a Philadelphia merchant and shipper who owned the brigantine "Betsy." His estate administration after his death in 1699 mentions business in Baltimore, and cattle on Gibson's Island, near the Baltimore harbor. James Standfield and Charles Pickering, merchants of Pennsylvania, were witnesses when John Richardson Sr. of Kent County in Pennsylvania conveyed all his property in Maryland to John Edmonson Sr. of Talbot County, County, Maryland. In 1706, the probate of Henry Bishop in Maryland mentioned a payment to the estate of James Standfield, merchant. Francis Chadsey, another uncle of Elizabeth Huntley Fisher, did not complete the accounting of James Standfield's estate until 1707.

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Thomas Fisher of Tuckahoe River, in Talbot County (Maryland), emigrated at about the same time as the Bakers and Thomas Fisher of Pennsylvania. His son Thomas can be traced in the Maryland records and did not go to Pennsylvania, but it is interesting that both Thomas Robinson (of Cecil County) and Thomas Fisher (of Tuckahoe) were captains in the Maryland Militia. Another Thomas Fisher of Talbot County died intestate in 1698, leaving an administrator Anne Fisher and an unnamed minor heir. The origins of the Tuckahoe Fishers have not been traced. The evidence is not convincing that the Talbot County Fishers had anything to do with the Fishers of Chester County, Pennsylvania.

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Ralph Fishbourne, a Quaker, moved from Maryland to Pennsylvania in 1698. His son of the same name settled in Chester County and was a member of Concord Monthly Meeting when Thomas Fisher married Elizabeth Huntley at that meeting in 1713. He was a prominent early Quaker who moved to the town of Chester, on the Delaware River, in 1699. His father-in-law was John Simcock. In Chester, the property where Ralph Fishbourne and wife Elizabeth lived abutted that of Isaac Few, an uncle of Elizabeth (Huntley) Fisher (wife of Thomas Fisher of Kennet). In Maryland, Ralph Fishbourne had property on the Choptank River near Bollingbroke Creek, where William Robinson and William Fisher had been among the earliest property owners.

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The Frazer family of Maryland had ties with families in Pennsylvania and Delaware. Several Frazers by the name of Alexander are found in the records, and it is not possible to separate them with certainty. In 1706, Alexander Frazer bought land in Kennett, Chester County near the William Huntley tract, and in 1717 was named Constable for Kennett Township. In 1713 Alexander Frazer sold, to Nathan Baker, a water mill spanning Back Creek, a tributary of Elk River in Cecil County adjoining the land of Dr. William Fisher. Dr. William Fisher, one of the earliest landowners in Cecil County, held the same or nearby property during the 1660's. The creek runs into Newcastle County, Delaware, where Alexander Frazer moved from Cecil County. William Flower was of Chichester, Chester County, and was a member of the Concord Monthly Meeting where Thomas Fisher married in 1713.

In 1722, the heirs of Alexander Fraser, deceased, sold 20 acres of land and a water mill, on both sides of Back Creek in Cecil County, to Nathan Baker. The land was at the head of the northeast branch of Elk River. In the same year, Nathan Baker of Cecil County, merchant, and his wife Sarah sold the property to Joshua Gee and others, with a note that he would defend against any claim by Hester Brown (sister of Nathan Baker.) Also in that year Henry Worley of Cecil County, miller and his wife Mary sold land at the same place to the same group, noting defense of any claim of the heirs of Alexander Fraser, deceased and/or his widow Elizabeth Frazer.

Alexander Frazer of Cecil County was a member of the same church, St. Stephens (Anglican) in Cecil County where Thomas Robinson and William Fisher were also members.

Alexander Frasier of Maryland apparently was associated in some way with Thomas Robinson. He is mentioned along with Thomas Robinson in the Maryland inventory of Michael Tawney in 1692, and it was probably a relative of the same name who appears in the 1715 Kennet tax list, in Chester County, Pennsylvania, with Thomas Fisher and Thomas Robinson. The Dorchester County

administration of Alexander Frazer Sr. in 1709 mentions Mr. Thomas Robins and Francis Frazer. Alexander Jr. moved northward, to Cecil County and remained there, but his father disappeared from the records until 1723. In 1716 Alexander Frazer Jr. of Cecil County, planter, conveyed to William Perry of Dorchester County, planter, part of "Edmondsons Desire," being that part of said land which was left to said Frazer by will of Denis Dwane, containing 100 acres, being the upper part of the land bought by Dwane from John Atkey for 200 acres. In 1718, Alexander Fraser of Cecil County, planter, conveyed property to Andrew Price of Queen Anne's County.

Benoni Philips appears to be a brother-in-law of Charles Robinson, named in the 1713 will of Roger Clark of Dorchester County, Maryland. A Benoni Frazer died in Dorchester County in 1773. George Robinson of Chester County, Pennsylvania named Cicily Robinson in his will of 1717. Cicily Frazer died in 1776 in Caroline County, Maryland.

Prior to 1706 Alexander Frazer, gentleman of Calvert County, apparently went to Chester County, Pennsylvania under puzzling circumstances. In the fall of 1706, Alexander Frazer, "laborer of West Town" (Chester County, Pennsylvania), and Daniel Mackfarson, laborer of Birmingham, in the same county, bought adjoining lots in Kennet, Chester County, from John Guest Esquire of Philadelphia. Frances Chads, an uncle of Elizabeth Huntley (who married Thomas Fisher of Kennet in 1713, in Concord Monthly Meeting), witnessed Alexander Frazer's deed.

Alexander Frazer returned to Maryland by 1723. In early 1723, a court case in Calvert County gives a clue which may relate to Alexander Frazer's presence in Chester County, Pennsylvania. William Deale testified that Alexander Frazer, gentleman, had earlier left the province for a considerable number of years, abandoning his wife and children, and upon returning accused his wife of eloping with Deale, who claimed to have only loaned her money.

West Town, Chester County, where Alexander Frazer (believed to be of Maryland) lived in 1706, was in the verge of Concord Monthly Meeting where Thomas Fisher was a member in 1713. He then settled on his property in Kennett and became a member of Kennett (Newark) monthly meeting where the Fishers were members. Could there be a connection?

In 1744, a Maryland court record refers to a Thomas Fisher leaving Maryland. When John Hooper "flung up the lease" on a tract of land and wanted to transfer it to Thomas Fisher, the court said Thomas Fisher had "absconded" and could not be found. There was no mention of how long Hooper had kept the lease or where it was, and it is not known which Thomas Fisher is being referred to. But it is possible that it was a long-term lease, and Thomas Fisher had left long ago for Pennsylvania. If it was Thomas Fisher of Kennet, he had by that time moved to East Caln, further north in Chester County.

**

The Fishers of Dorchester County (Maryland), on the Nanticoke River, had connections to Smith and Thatcher families who may have been the same as families in Chester County, Pennsylvania. William Smith and Thomas Thacher were named overseers in the will of William Fisher, of Dorchester County in Maryland, written in 1698 and probated in 1702. Part of the Wallis tract in Kennet, next to Robinson and Fisher, descended from John Smith to Zorababel Thatcher, whose wife was a cousin to Phebe Pritchett, a possible relative of the Maryland Pritchetts. Mary Pritchett, who married Henry Fisher of Dorchester County before 1712, was born about 1683. These names are probably mere coincidences.

In 1700, Edward Fisher of Dorchester County, Maryland and his wife Francis sold their 1000-acre tract in southwestern Sussex County, Delaware to William Clark. Agent for the sale in Sussex County was Thomas Fisher, son of John and Margaret Fisher from Lancashire. This was probably only a coincidence.

In 1700, Edward Fisher of Dorchester County, brother of William, referred in his will to his sister-in-law Thomasin Fisher. Thomasin Rideaux (probably a misreading of Prideaux) is known to have married John Robinson in 1676, in Somerset County. In 1714, a son Samuel was born to William and Thomasin Boulding, recorded at St. Stephens Anglican Church in North Sassafras Parish, Cecil County, where members included Thomas Robinson and William and Mary Fisher.

Thomas Robinson could have been a son of John and Thomasin (Rideaux/Prideaux) Robinson. Thomasin may have been the sister-in-law mentioned in the 1700 will of Edward Fisher, of Dorchester County. It is not known if she was related to Thomasin, wife of William Boulton of Cecil County, who appears in the records of St. Stephens.

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In conclusion, the Maryland study did not produce convincing evidence that the early Robinsons and Fishers of Chester County were connected to the early Robinsons and Fishers of Maryland:

- (1) Thomas Robinson of Cecil County (Maryland) and London was almost certainly the merchant/seaman who appears in shipping records until 1715, and was possibly (but not likely) the one who obtained land with Thomas Fisher in Chester County, Pennsylvania next to another merchant/seaman, James Wallis.
- (2) Nathan Baker, passenger on the "Vine" from Lancashire, settled first in Concord, Chester County, Pennsylvania where Thomas Fisher was married in 1713, then settled by 1722 at a water mill at the mouth of Back Creek on Elk River, Cecil County, Maryland, on or near land originally owned in 1662 by Dr. William Fisher of Maryland and Virginia. Alexander Frazer of Cecil County, Maryland bought land in Kennett, Chester County Pennsylvania in 1706 and settled there. He or a relative of the same name sold the Cecil County property to Nathan Baker in 1722. These correlations are probably mere coincidences.

Pg. 131 Deed. On 30 May 1751 William Webb of Kennett, Esq., & Rebecca his wife, to William Webb, Jr. of Kennett, yeoman. Whereas the commissioners of William Penn by deed dated 12 Oct 1702 granted to James Wallace of Bristoll a tract in Kennett containing 515 acres, being part of 1000 acres which William Penn granted to James Wallace in the year 1681, recorded in Philadelphia, Book A., vol 2, Page 381. Whereas James Wallace by Letter of Attorney dated 22 Sep 1688, recorded in Philadelphia, Book D2, vol 5, Page 24, appointed Thomas Withers his attorney to sell said lands. Whereas Thomas Withers by deed dated 24 Nov 1702 granted to John Smith of Chester County, clock maker the said 515 acres. John Smith made his will dated 30 Dec 1706 & devised to his wife Mary, the said 515 acres. Whereas Mary has since married John Borough, yeoman, who by their deed dated 22 & 23 June 1712 granted the 515 acres to Nicholas Pyle. Nicholas Pyle made his will dated 6 Oct 1715 & amongst other things devised to his son Samuel a tract containing 257 1/2 acres, located on the southern end of the said tract in Kennett, also giving Samuel L27 when he turns 21 years & devised to his other son Joseph, the other moiety of the said 515 acres, being 257 1/2 acres & L27 when he turns 21 years. If either son shall die before the age of 21 the survivor shall have the whole 515 acres. The said Nickolas Pyle soon after died. Whereas Joseph Pyle died underage, and the whole estate came to Samuel Pyle. Whereas Samuel Pyle granted 301 acres of the 515 acres to William Webb. Now William Webb, Sr. & Rebecca his wife for the natural love they bear their son, grant to William Webb, Jr. a tract in Kennett bounded by land of William Harry, land of Zerobable Thatcher, other land of William Webb, Daniel Webb & Joshua Pierce, containing 246 acres. Pg. 756 Robert Way appeared as a witness at Chester Court 10th mo., 1686. In 1691 he purchased 150 acres on the Brandywine, in Kennet, now Pennsbury township, where he died in 1725. His wife, Hannah, was the daughter of Francis and Elizabeth Hickman, and their children were John, Robert, Joseph, Jacob, Elizabeth, Francis, Caleb, Joshua, James, and Benjamin.

Pg. 600 the Hickmans came from Marlborough in Wiltshire.

Pg. 756 John Way was born 9, 15, 1694, and died 8, 21, 1777, married Ann, daughter of John and Margery Hannum, of Concord, and settled near his father.

Jacob Way married Sarah Hannum, sister to his brother's wife, and after her death married Hannah, daughter of William Harvey, 4,10,1741. He married 3rd Lydia Sharples Vernon.

Joseph Way married Sarah Pyle.

James Way was a blacksmith, and lived in Thornbury at the time of his marriage 4,8,1738 to Mary Kerlin, daughter of Matthias, of Concord. They afterwards settled in West Caln, and had a tayern at Wagontown.
